PVA Board Meeting Highlights: June and July 2021

Principal's Report:

- Dr. Covert announced next year's slogan "Together Again".
- Enrollment is up, with more than 300 new students coming to Pine View in the fall.
- The transition program for students new to Pine View will be held over the summer. The program, normally for sixth- and ninth-grade students, will be expanded to include seventh- and 10th-graders as the program was cancelled last summer because of pandemic concerns.
- New trees are being planted around campus to replace those lost to construction.
- Graduation was held at the Van Wezel and Cobalt was held on the Pine View campus.
- Maggie Adler, longtime assistant to the Pine View principal, has retired.

PVA Activities and General Discussion:

- PVA met with and signed up many new members at summer orientation
- Board members saw the samples of the gifts given to each 2021 graduating senior: A PV key chain, PV sticker and a blue fuzzy face pen.
- Board members began the process of reviewing, revising and approving the PVA budget.

PVA Funding Report

What a difference our Pine View family and business sponsors' donations can make! Now it is our turn to share how and where these contributions and donations go toward supporting our wonderful Pine View School. All donations received go directly back into the school, and without you, none of this would be possible! The following is what the funds from the last 1 ½ years allowed PVA to do.

- 1) PVA was able to purchase the planetarium to promote science and astronomy education.
- 2) PVA helped fund the *Torch, Match* & *Spark* so the journalism classes can continue to share their creative, interesting and fun articles. And these publications can be distributed to the students at no charge!
- 3) PVA funded the fifth-grade classes' request for The Daffodil Project, a worldwide endeavor to remember the 1.5 million children lost during the Holocaust. The funds covered items necessary to plant the garden and for the purchase of two books that discussed what happened during this time period. Daffodils represent the yellow stars that Jews were forced to wear during the Holocaust, and the flower symbolizes both remembrance and resilience. This project is an educational endeavor for 5th and 7th grade students to help them understand and remember the struggles of Jewish children during WWII.
- 4) PVA provided funding for the Drone Club to purchase three drone kits to be built by the students, used to educate in piloting the drones, and in drone competitions.
- 5) Every year PVA commits to purchasing agenda books for elementary and middle school students.
- 6) Water purification systems were purchased and strategically placed around the campus to aid students in accessing cold, fresh water to fill water bottles at any time throughout the day.
- 7) Unfortunately, PVA was not able to be on campus for the 2020-21 school year but still wanted to be able to reward our hard-working students for their grades with smoothies, Starbucks, popsicles and other goodies. Popsicles were able to be distributed and gift cards were purchased for students to enjoy smoothies, Starbucks, Chick Fil-A and other items off campus.
- 8) PVA purchased Nearpods (this software program can be used year after year) and licensing for more than 40 teachers to provide another educational platform for our students.
- 9) Last school year, traveling was not an option for competitions due to the pandemic, but in past years and this fall we have provided funding to clubs such as Speech & Debate and Model UN to lessen the costs of travel and competition fees.
- 10) PVA is honored and proud to help support 8th and 12th grade graduation.

How did you end up in Sarasota?

This was an easy one for us. My soon-to-be husband and I could not wait to get out of what we felt was a cold and dreary world in Illinois. We both lived just outside of Chicago our entire lives and

were ready for a change. We married and left for our honeymoon. Upon our return, it took us a day and a half to pack everything we could take with us and leave for sunny days and warm weather. What's your connection to Pine View?

Just by coincidence, I was at a birthday party for my son and happened to meet the woman who had tested Noah at his school. She was the one who told me all about Pine View and everything this school had to offer a child like my son. Noah (at the tender age of 7) and I visited a few different schools. Honestly, when Noah toured Pine View, he said this is where he wanted to be! It was such a perfect fit for him and he really felt like he belonged. My two girls, Isabel and Mia, followed in his footsteps! All three started at Pine View in second grade and now, Noah is in 11th grade, Isabel is in 8th and Mia is in 7th grade.

Pine View has been such a wonderful experience for all three of my children.

Why did you get involved in PVA and what is your role?

During Noah's first year at Pine View, I had the opportunity to be quite involved in his classroom on a weekly basis. I helped students who were struggling with different topics, ran errands for his teacher and helped to promote a cohesive and focused classroom. When Isabel started 2nd grade, I volunteered to be the "classroom mom". How did you end up in Sarasota?

When the University of Virginia, for which I worked in Alumni and Parent Engagement and Annual Giving at the time, told me I could live anywhere in my territory, I chose to move my family to Venice so we could be close to my parents who retired here in the mid-90s. We have lived in Venice since The2007 and my PV Class of 2020 daughter and Class of 2023 son have attended Pine View since second grade. Because my children were excelling at PV and I was serving as President of the Pine View Association, I turned down the University's offer ten years later to move to Charlottesville so we could stay at this magnificent school and continue living in paradise.

I then worked as VP of Strategic Philanthropy for the Education Foundation of Sarasota County and served the wonderful public schools our area has for every type of learner. I also served on the Friends board of the Venice Public Library and helped with fundraising to make the new VPL the state-of-the-art "university for all" that it should be. Describe your experience at Pine View.

It alternated between getting referrals from Mrs. Salzman and Burger King with Thomas Koshy. But to be honest, the thing I remember the most was being in awe of the work ethic and intellect of so many of my classmates.

What was your favorite thing about the school?

While I was there, I'd probably have said the warm Otis Spunkmyer cookies. In reality, during my time at Pine View, my favorite part was the faculty. I felt like teachers didn't just think their job was to teach you US History, but to make you learn about the world and how to be an adult.

Today though, I'd say it was the enduring friendships I have with so many of my classmates.

Do you have any fond memories, favorite teachers, etc.

I think everyone at PV has fond memories and favorite teachers. I'll never forget the first day of AP Chemistry, when Doc Malinsky turned water into wine and then milk. She claimed she used chemistry to do it, but I think she secretly is a wizard. I'll also never forget the conversations I had with Mr. McCracken during AP History and AP Government. Mr. McCracken was one of those rare souls who really treated us more like equals and students, and I think his class was my first taste of adulthood.

And I'll never forget the Fridays after school when Rocco played flag football with a bunch of students. Kyle Cookerly was a classmate of mine and so fast that he was always open, but everyone knew not to throw the ball to him because he'd drop everything.

Where did life take you after graduating PV?

At first, not far. I went to the University of Florida



and graduated in 2005. I went on to attend Harvard Law School, and became a lawyer in New York City for a few years. I left my job as a lawyer to start a couple businesses. The first was a daily deals site like groupon, and the second was a deodorant company called Native.

How did PV prepare you for your career/the real world?

Pine View was, and I hope still is, one of those rare places where you're surrounded by people who are blessed with both intelligence and passion. Only after leaving Pine View do you realize how rare that is, and as you get older, you try to replicate that environment everywhere you go.

I imagine people go their entire lives not knowing that type of environment can exist. I'm glad I got to see it first hand at such a young age.

Have you maintained a connection to PV and other PV students?

How do you think PV has changed since you attended?

I was in Sarasota for the first time in a decade recently, and couldn't pass up the chance of driving to campus. From the outside, Pine View still looks yellow and blue. From the inside, so many of the faces that shaped the human that I am — from Mrs. Myers to Mrs. Bobrow — have retired and that is bittersweet. I hope that the new generation of mentors and teachers at Pine View can live up to the legacy of the past generation.


Pine View Principal Dr. Stephen Covert said Ms. Myers has spurred students to lifelong success.

Pine View Establishes Coach Donovan Memorial Scholarship

Pine View has set up a scholarship in memory of Shannon Donovan, who was a beloved staff member at the school from 1979 until her retirement in 2013. She came to Pine View as a PE aide, and during her career she taught gym classes in both elementary and middle school, and coached tennis, track and field, and street hockey. Coach Donovan was an advocate for students, families and community needs and was a driving force behind the school community service projects that responded to those needs.



"Coach Donovan was the definition of a positive role model for Pine View's students," said Principal Dr. Stephen Covert. "The stories of her are almost legendary, and she truly is one of the Pine View giants on whose shoulders we stand today."

From a Sarasota Herald-Tribune story in 2008: "Donovan is a physical education aide but essentially, she is the activities coordinator, freshman class sponsor, blood drive coordinator, intramural sports coordinator, street hockey coach, tennis coach, athletic director, track and field coach, Special Olympics host and character education organizer.... Ask anyone what Donovan actually does and you get a chuckle and a one word answer: Everything." with students, teachers and administrators; eventually they chose New York sanitation workers as their focus.

"The students sent 500 pairs of thick, heavy, work gloves with notes of encouragement tucked inside, to the workers who cleaned up the debris at the World Trade Center.

"Major projects have since become a tradition. Last year Donovan and her students built a house for Habitat for Humanity. In years past they have

adopted Gocio Elementary School for book and school supply drives, Memorial Elementary School in Arcadia and schools in Pascagoula, Miss., after hurricanes demolished their communities.

"She keeps her philosophy simple: "I just try to empower the kids, teach them that one person can make a difference. Be aware, try to fill the need. That's the best I can do."

Each school was represented by its top five golfers, and Pine View Middle School defeated all seven Sarasota County middle schools.


Chloe Chang, as an eighthgrader, had the lowest score of all competitors in the championship and was undefeated for the entire


