2022 Pinnacle Sets New Bar for Helping Pine View

Who knew raising money and giving back could also be so much fun? Pinnacle, a time-honored tradition, was back in full swing on Saturday, Feb. 26. The Pine View Association's most lucrative fundraiser did not disappoint—in fact, it exceeded all expectations.

"The vote is in and it is unanimous! The Carnevale Di Venezia Pinnacle was a huge success in so many ways!" said PVA President Lisa Stern. "Great entertainment, teacher presence, engaging speakers, exciting auctioneers, and awesome Pine View family participation. It was an opportunity to bring the Pine View family back together again in a big way and having teachers attend the gala was an added bonus. It was wonderful to see so many familiar faces."

This year's theme, "Carnevale Di Venezia" Masquerade Ball, featured live entertainment and auction, a VIP pre-cocktail party, dancing, and even a real gondola sponsored by Varone Orthodontics and Step and Repeat by CAN Community Health for photo ops.

"Pinnacle is a true collaboration of school staff, parents, students, and local businesses in support of Pine View School and the excellent educational opportunities that this incredible school provides for our children," stated Jesse Kichi and Gabriela Lodeiro Polinsky, the gala's co-chairs, in the evening's program.

Mrs. Kichi and Dr. Lodeiro Polinsky brought flair and sophistication to the evening's festivities by starting off with a VIP Murano Cocktail Reception by Charlotte's Grace Fine Linens at 5:00 p.m. at The Circus Arts Conservatory, underwritten by the Famiglio family and highlighted by a violin performance by Sarasota Music Conservatory featuring Pine View students, an upside-down Champagne Pour, and a Super Silent Auction.

As teachers, parents, friends, administrators, and alumni arrived on the Infiniti of Sarasota-sponsored red carpet, they were greeted by student paparazzi and Pine View Key Club door-holders and receivers who ushered them through the magical entrance and into the expansive reception area and checked them in. No detail was missed by Decoration Committee Co-Chairs Alisa Craig and Liz Sandburg and their dedicated volunteers. From the Clever Cup/STEMania-sponsored ten-foot masquerade mask that hung over the stage to the restrooms decked out in Venetian floral arrangements, guests felt transported to Venice, Italy, at the height of the social season.

Ambient performers entertained the 358 guests throughout the evening as they took 1,200 butlered hors d'oeuvres and wine from Pine View parent Paul Mattison's staff. The 30-foot-long La Luna Bar, sponsored by Arsenault Dermatology & Glow Dermspa, spanned an entire wall of the performance-turned-reception space and offered every type of beverage. Every table, curated by Seating Committee Chair Jaime Heath, had minimasks, custom individually wrapped cookies and a gorgeous centerpiece with florals provided by Victoria Blooms, the flower design studio of Pine View parent Victoria Warren. Mattison's Tuscan kale salad with Brussels sprouts, poached pears, and parmesan, with a honey-lemon vinaigrette had been selected to start, along with house-made focaccia with Boursin butter. Dinner arrived with a flourish by the expert waitstaff, offering Italian herb-roasted chicken with cipollini onions, blistered tomatoes, and rosemary aioli roasted vegetables or vegan saffron risotto, complemented with oven-roasted fennel pollen potatoes and *(continued on page 4)*

zucchini noodles. The three-tiered dessert plate at each table completed the delicious meal with pistachio ricotta cannoli, Zabaglione Frutta di Bosca, tiramisu cups, and chocolate Tartufo. Pine View's own Orchestra, led by Nathaniel Widjaja and featuring Grayson Cicillioni, Olivia Daige, Teagan English, Patrick Enright, Ignacio Hurtado, Sophia Korman, Hayley Peace and Matrick Thorpe, performed beautiful music throughout the dinner.

Dr. Stephen Covert, principal of Pine View School for the Gifted, and Mrs. Kichi and Dr. Lodeiro Polinksy welcomed the guests and played a video by PV teacher Mark Goebel, featuring students and teachers whose educational experience has been improved by the opportunities PVA provides through events like the Carnevale Di Venezia-themed Pinnacle.

Andrea Paul, Ccair of the Donation Committee, raised the bar for all future Pinnacles by securing hundreds of family and business donors and underwriters and offering such amazing live auction items as an Ultimate Sports Fan Package, Principal for a Day, Reserved Parking at PV, and a Steamboat Springs Ski-in Condo. Topping it all were two Blackberry Farm, a Relais & Châteaux resort in Tennessee, cottage stays, which included private jet round-trip travel, activities, and gourmet meals included. Each was auctioned off by Tarryn and Jason Troutman of Auction Horizon for \$12,000. The SmileWorks Kids Dentistry paddle raise, the live and Radiance Endodontics silent and Gastroenterology Associates super silent auctions combined netted more than \$160,000 for Pine View School.

Pine View Alumnus, PVA Board Director, Pine View dad and business leader Dr. Manav Malik reminisced about his time at Pine View and urged everyone to connect with alumni to help grow the Pine View family and provide more mentoring and mock college interview opportunities for our exceptional students. The Circus Arts Conservatory Performers featuring Pine View students stunned the audience below as aerialists made lovely designs on silks, performed daring feats on tightrope, made us laugh with their clowning antics, and inspired us all with their athleticism and creativity. The evening ended with an "Arrivederci" from the sponsors and chairs and a promise of a great time again next year.

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



PINE VIEW FAIR RETURNS, RAISES FUNDS AND AWARENESS FOR ACTIVITIES



The long-running tradition of PVA's Pine View Fair returned on January 22, bringing students, families and guests to campus to learn about and support student clubs and other activities.

Students, faculty and parents staffed more than 50 booths, representing groups like Jungle Robotics, Pine View Band, the History Club, Model United Nations, the Math Club, the French Club, the Pine View Torch and Yearbook, and many others. Among other highlights were a rock-climbing wall, a "jousting" arena and a

dunk tank where students could try to send Principal Covert and others plunging into the water.

By day's end, people had bought more than 50,000 tickets for the various contests, raffles and rides, raising more than \$20,000 for teachers and clubs.

PVA board member and Fair Chairman Ben Turoff, also an alumnus, said attendance was as strong as ever, and that it was good to see the event continuing.

"I remember how much fun it was when I went to Pine View and my folks were involved with some of the very first fairs," he said. "I enjoy the community aspect of the Fair- it is Pine View's biggest event and everyone is invited to participate. Since Pine View is uniquely a 2-12 school, it is extremely fulfilling to see how the different ages all work together."



PV Speech & Debate Club Powers Through Spring

Pine View Speech & Debate Club had a busy and impressive spring, with members taking top honors at multiple events and qualifying for national tournaments.

On March 5-6, PVSD sent 11 qualifying members to compete in the Florida Forensic League's Varsity State tournament at Apopka High School. Arya Gupta (2023) and Grace Johnson (2022) reached semifinals in the International Extemporaneous Speaking event. Edden Levy (2024) reached the octofinals in Lincoln Douglas Debate. Rafeh Khan (2023) and Shailan Patel (2023) also reached the octofinals in Public Forum Debate.

Also competing were Ray Min (2022), Congress; Tiffany Yu (2023), Dramatic Interpretation; Summer Bossman (2022), Humorous Interpretation; and Joanna Malvas (2022) Krystal Tran (2023) and Nathan Widjaja (2023), in World Schools Debate.

Recognizing PVSD's success, the club's coach, Mr. Jym Froelich, received the FFL Region III Coach of the Year Honor— and, for his efforts in recruiting a dozen new schools into Region III this past fall, he was then awarded the overall 2021-2022 Coach of the Year for the State of Florida.

PV Speech & Debate (continued)

Previously, 20 members of Pine View Speech and Debate competed Feb. 26 at the FGCCFL Grand Finals tournament at Jesuit High School in Tampa. Ten students finished as National Qualifiers or National Qualifier Alternates, earning themselves a trip to Washington, D.C. on Memorial Day Weekend to compete at Grand Nationals, an enormous feat.

In Congressional Debate, national qualifiers were Ray Min, Captain (2022); Sonica Prakash, Debate VP (2022); and Krystal Tran, Secretary (2023).

In Duo Interpretation, national qualifiers were Grace Johnson, Speech VP, and Joanna Malvas, President (2022). In Extemporaneous Speaking, Emre Muessemeyer (2023) was named a national qualifier alternate.

In Original Oratory, national qualifiers were Alyson Mizanin, Captain (2023) and Shalini Nair (2025), also a first-time competitor. In Public Forum Debate, the team of Peter Deverdzic and Nina Wasluk (2025) were named national qualifier alternates.

At Strawberry Crest High School on Jan. 22, members of PVSD's Congress delegation vied for qualifying bids to the NSDA National Championships in Louisville, KY, while the team's other events competed in the season's final FGCCFL local.

At the NSDA FL Sunshine League's National Qualifying Tournament for Congressional Debate, in the House Chamber, Sonica Prakash (2022) was named the 1st Alternate National Qualifier and Krystal Tran (2023) was recognized for her service as the chamber's Presiding Officer & was named the league's top National Qualifier. Pine View School was the recipient of the NSDA Florida Sunshine League's Congress Quals Sweepstakes Award for the fourth consecutive year.

At the Florida Gulf Coast Catholic Forensic League local tournament, competing in Extemporaneous Speaking, Arya Gupta took third place, and competing in Public Forum Debate (pairs), Rafeh Khan & Shailan Patel (2023) took third place.

Competing in Original Oratory, Alyson Mizanin (2023) took first place, while in her first-ever tournament, Shalini Nair (2025) took second place. Performing their piece in competition for the first time ever, the Duo Interpretation team of Grace Johnson (2022) & Joanna Malvas (2022) captured first place.

"Our successes come through extremely hard work and preparation, but in large part from the support of our generous and beloved PVA, amazing administration and staff, and so many dedicated parents and family members," Mr. Froelich said.

Pine View Band and Chorus Dominate the Worldstrides Music Festival

The Pine View Bands and Chorus competed in the WorldStrides Music Festival at Universal Studios in Orlando March 25 and 26. The Pine View Band has been competing in the Worldstrides Festivals for over a decade, almost always winning top honors in their classes, but this year put on their strongest performance ever.

WorldStrides draws bands from all over the country for the chance to compete and have fun in the theme parks. Competing against a dozen strong bands and chorus groups, both the Jazz Band and Wind Ensemble scored Gold - First Place and top band awards in their respective categories. They also won both the Adjudicator's Award for highest combined score, as well as the Festival Award for the highest combined score for a school, in partnership with Chorus. The band was invited to the Festival of Gold in Nashville and also had two students singled out for individual awards. "I was incredibly proud of both bands' performances," said PV Bands Director Mr. Mongillo. "This was the most awards accrued during any of the Festivals we have attended."

The Pine View Concert Choir received a Silver rating in performance. For this performance, Pine View combined students from both HS Treble Choir and Vocal Ensemble. "They did a wonderful job of working together, blending, and executing the music beautifully," said Chorus Director Seth Gardner. "The on-stage clinician was incredible and commented on how responsive the choir was. This teamwork brought them within striking distance of a GOLD rating."

The bonus of this weekend was watching the students support each others' groups with lots of positive cheering, yelling and screaming, the directors said. They also noted that among the big crowds at the hotel and at Universal Studios, students comported themselves exquisitely, made fantastic decisions, were on time for every check-in and had tons of fun.

"I took great joy in seeing our band students interact outside the band room, and make new friends within our amazing band family!" said Mr. Mongillo.

"My favorite moments over the last three days were those spent talking with the students while waiting in line or having a meal," Gardner said. "The level of empathy and compassion that exists in this generation, gives us hope for the future."

Pine View Peramathon 2022

Pine View's elementary and middle school students came together on March 11 to renew our amazing school tradition, Peramathon. It was a hot and windy day, but everyone had smiles on their faces as they set out to tackle their hour of running, jogging, or walking along the track.

Nearly 1,000 students joined their teachers in the first large on-campus activity since 2020, and by the end of the day they had logged an astounding 3,000 combined miles! They were supported by enthusiastic volunteers and parents who encouraged and cheered on their students. At the end of their

The fundraising leading up to Peramathon was astounding. Students were rewarded with weekly cumulative prizes based on the pledges they received from family and friends. 

P.V.A. Middle School Report

Excerpted from Mr. Ball's February report to PVA

In **Mrs. Molinaro**'s Ancient History class, students learned about the different Kingdoms of Ancient Egypt. They studied about the pharaohs and their different monuments of the time periods. They worked

collaboratively to put together a part of a temple. Students culminated their Ancient Egypt Unit with making their own personal Egyptian Cartouche. This is where they write the name of a pharaoh in hieroglyphs within an oval. They were made from clay, baked, painted, and packaged for a safe journey home. Students also explored different ways to interactively study for unit tests. One was to make a game of Taboo.





With the support of parents, **Ms. Maiello**'s Life Science students were able to purchase and read books related to science, including *Rosalind Franklin: The Dark Lady of DNA*. As part of the schoolwide literacy week, her eighth grade students decorated their science door. Students drew using chalk the "x-ray" image for which Dr. Franklin is famous, and hanging from the door were strands of the double DNA made from pipe cleaners & colored beads. Eighth-grade Life Science students also did a lab identifying the parts of the double helix in science class.

They also went outside and stood on PV's new "Double Helix" pavers in the center of campus, organizing themselves and standing on the bricks, representing the nitrogen bases, the hydrogen bonds holding the nitrogen bases together, and the sugars & phosphates located on the side bricks of the double helix.

Students in **Ms. Hazlett**'s class finished reading *Lord of the Flies* and collaborated to analyze different symbols in *Lord of the Flies* and then presented their creative display to the class. They also celebrated Literacy Week, wrote a mock-FSA argumentative essay, and began reading Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Students engaged in a Socratic Seminar to discuss the prominent themes in the book. They took class "on the road" to participate in a Socratic Seminar in the new, comfortable space on the 2nd floor of the new building. 
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
Ms. Rosander's sixth-grade






Ms. Siwicka's students completed their family trees in French.

- 3. Your username is your N number. Your password is our school number "0021"
- 4. Please print out the log sheets. They will be pre-populated with the organization(s) which you have selected for your volunteer time/hours
- 5. Once you have completed 100 hours of community service, please return the completed log sheets, along with the "Community Service Plan and Evaluation Form" to the guidance office. These hours will be placed onto your transcript and will automatically be picked up for eligibility for the Bright Futures Scholarship.

The "Community Service Plan and Evaluation Form" can be printed and completed by logging into the community service system (using directions above) and clicking on the community organizations you have chosen for your hours.

^{*}Community service hours are required for certain scholarships, such as the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship. They are not required to meet eligibility for high school graduation.

^{*}Community service hours earned no longer equate to .5 or 1 credit on high school transcripts.


