



Hundreds of members of the Pine View community gathered on April 22 for the dedication of Ethan's Rock and Mineral Garden, a memorial to sixth-grader Ethan Isaacs. The event was on Earth Day, which coincides with Ethan's birthday.

The garden, located between the science buildings and media center, is an interactive space that reflects Ethan's love of geology, nature and science. The vision for the garden grew from the Isaacs family remembering Ethan with Marie Rosander, his science teacher, and Melissa Abela, the middle school assistant principal.

"Every time we went somewhere, he came home with a pocket of rocks," Ethan's parents, Mindy and Greg Isaacs, told the Pine View Torch. "It started in kindergarten when he would come home with rocks in his pockets. It seemed like he was searching for treasure."

Ethan lost his life in a sailing accident in November 2020, and his family and a committee of teachers and parents came together to develop a way to both remember him and help his friends and classmates heal.

Marie Rosander, who taught Ethan in sixth grade science, told the Torch that the garden can be a

space not only for learning but also for comfort and contemplation. Principal Melissa Abela noted that it is designed to engage people, and not just be a sight they observe at a distance.

The garden includes a winding path with displays of gems, geodes, rocks and minerals — many donated by Ethan's grandfather — as well as stones painted by Ethan's classmates, and a shaded gazebo where people can meet, talk or just sit and relax.

The dedication included remembrances from Abela, Rosander and Ethan's parents and brother Tanner, a rising 11th grader, as well as family friend Dr. Stephen McConnell and several of Ethan's friends.

SCHOOL YEAR IN REVIEW:

PINE VIEW AGAIN LEADS FLORIDA IN ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE AND EXCELS OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

As we start the 2022-23 school year, it's worth taking a moment to recap the previous year at Pine View and consider the incredible successes achieved by our students and staff. They give us a tremendous base to build upon for the coming year.

The Florida Department recently released its School Grades Report for the 2021-22 school year. For the report, the state assesses how schools perform in 11 categories, such as English Language Arts Achievement and Mathematics Learning Gains.

Pine View led all Florida public schools – nearly 3,000 of them – with a score of 1,045 of a possible 1,100 points.

The underlying statistics provide some examples of how Pine View did so well. At the elementary level, our mean scale score of 331 on the third grade FSA test in ELA was the highest in the Sarasota school district and the entire state of Florida, and an increase from the previous assessment despite the challenges of COVID-19. The third graders had a 100% pass rate, and 52% scored at level 5, the highest possible level.

In middle school, students taking the Algebra 1 FSA posted a 548 mean scale score, compared to the district's mean of 507 and the state's mean of 495. Again, Pine View students had the highest mean scale score in the state of Florida, and 81% achieved level 5.

Overall, Pine View led all Florida public schools in ELA, Math and Social Studies achievement

and was just one percentage point from leading in Science achievement as well.

While these scores are remarkable in and of themselves, even more important is that the data shows that Pine View students – already scoring at the highest levels – are continuing to grow and achieve above and beyond even the expected level of growth. That is truly noteworthy!

Pine View's successes extended to the graduating class. The Class of 2022 boasts a 100% graduation rate, and a 100% acceptance rate in college, university, and employment pursuits, as well as over \$7,000,000 in merit and need-based scholarships, grants, Bright Futures, and Benaquisto Scholarships for the Class of 2022. In addition, the senior class includes 20 National Merit Finalists, which is one of the highest percentages in the United States.

Our students also excelled outside the classroom. Pine View's MathWorks Math Modeling team, under Dr. Mattia's leadership, placed first in the world in technical computing category, as well as third in the world overall. Pine View Speech and Debate member Aadi Bensdadhia placed third in the United States.

We also launched or expanded important initiatives. We began full implementation of the StarLab with grades 2 through 12 classes, and a focus on Dual Enrollment Astronomy in collaboration with PVA who helped fund the purchase of the Starlab. Pine View successfully collaborated with PVA, an anonymous

local foundation, and the district for a 3-yr commitment of over \$380,000 to create a new College and Career Advisor position focusing on grades 8 through 11. Dr. Lori Wiley will partner with Senior College and Career Counselor, Lance Bergman, who focuses on our senior class.

Pine View successfully opened a new \$30 million instructional space on campus, thanks to the effort of Ms. Abela, Harvard-Jolly, Tandem Construction, our district construction team, PVA, and our entire community. As part of the new building, we created a beautiful new DNA "ribbon" memorial brick area, with opportunities for naming as part of campus renovation in collaboration with PVA. (Those opportunities will be available, again, this fall.) We also were able to also increase space on campus for new trees near Building 16.

The Pine View Garden was awarded a \$2,500-plus grant through University of Florida Extension Office, and Pine View Elementary was awarded Florida Wildflower Foundation's 2022 Seedlings for Schools grant. The expanded Pine View Garden is beautiful, and is an amazing example of parental involvement, support from PVA, engagement with our student leaders, and involvement with PV faculty.

We created the Pine View Legacy Garden to memorialize important contributors to our campus and community, like Dr. Eloise Malinsky, and created a beautiful new covered outdoor eating area for hundreds of students. And at the close of the school year, we dedicated the new Pine View Archives in memory of longtime and much-beloved PV faculty member, Patricia E. Johnston. This was a very special celebration, supported by our alumni and PVA.

Finally, it's important to note that the entire community successfully passed the 1-mill referendum. For Pine View, that referendum provides \$1,715,622 in funding, supporting three art teachers, four music teachers, three computer teachers, three clerical positions, three campus security monitors, two teachers on special assignment, three school counselors, and two library media aides. It also provides for instructional extra-duty days for teachers, support staff extra-duty days, and additional instructional minutes for all students daily.

This coming school year promises to be an amazing and exciting year for our Pine View students, building on and continuing our tradition of excellence. We appreciate all the positive support from the Pine View School parents and our community, and look forward to another great year!





Your PVA ad Work

PVA Recaps Achievements for the 2021-22 School Year

Pine View Association rebounded from the pandemic year with one of its most successful years ever, supporting virtually every elementary, middle and high school student in various ways, and creating collaboration and friendships across students, faculty and staff.

Every year, PVA provides funding for dozens of initiatives from the school's administration, faculty and students, and this past school year the association continued that tradition, distributing more than \$96,000 in grants, big and small.

"Some people don't really know what PVA does at Pine View," said Lisa Stern, PVA's president. "A lot of our work is right there in plain sight, but no one knows that it comes from PVA. And so much more is under the radar but really improves the Pine View experience, whether it's grants to teachers so they can bring programs and resources to their students, or to student groups, so kids can develop interests beyond the classroom, or support for special projects that enhance the campus."

PVA's biggest single initiative in the 2021-22 year was funding a \$38,341 from the school administration to support a new staff position at Pine View, the College and Career Counselor for Grades 8 through 11. Pine View administrator Lori Wiley was hired for the position.

PVA joined the administration and a private local foundation in covering the cost of the position, which complements the work of PV College Counselor Lance Bergman and extends college and job preparation to younger students. Bergman reported that the new position has already paid off with expanded programming for

high school and middle school students in the 2021-22 year.

- a three-part series, Introduction to College Planning I-III, presented to rising seniors (Class of 2023), which is normally a single presentation to the entire class.
- a two-part College Planning session for rising juniors (Class of 2024), covering an introduction to key resources (PVS counseling website and Naviance), creating a testing plan, building a resume, and more.
- a two-part Career Exploration series for rising freshmen (Class of 2027).

Next year, the team plans to offer specialized instructional sessions for students, by current and retired Pine View teachers; a college essay writing series for seniors; SAT and ACT test preparation series for juniors; and a Resume Workshop for sophomores and juniors.

A selection of PVA's other 2021-22 grants include:

- \$15,000 to Pine View Speech and Debate Club, supporting coaching, travel and tournament registration fees. PVS&D has grown to more than 100 members, one of the largest and most active clubs on campus, and had a tremendous 2021-22 season. Members took top honors at multiple regional and state events and qualified for national tournaments. (See page 47)
- \$12,000 to purchase agenda planning notebooks, which are provided to every Pine View student.
- \$3,295 for a teacher request to purchase the


ReFlex Program, a highly regarded, computer-based math fluency program for Grades 2 through 6.


- \$3,180 for the Daffodil Project, funding the Pine View 5th Grade Team's participation in an international project of planting daffodils to remember the 1.5 million children who died in Nazi-occupied Europe. PVA provided funding for flowers, paint, garden supplies and landscaping, as well as for copies of "The Diary of Anne Frank" and "Prisoner B3087."
- \$2,500 for supplies for the renewed Pine View Garden, where under the leadership of Garden Coordinator Lesley Sachs, about 100 students volunteer each week to plant, water, and weed the beds, and build and maintain elements of the garden. In addition, Ms. Maiello, Mr. Yotsuda, Mr. Vitkus, Ms. Kolsky, and Ms. Rosander all have used the garden as a teaching tool for their classes. (See January 2022 issue of *Pine Views*.)

PVA also puts on two annual events: the Pine View Fair, a school-wide festival for student clubs to meet new members and raise funds, and Teacher Recognition Week, a series of lunches and treats rewarding Pine View faculty for their hard work and dedication.

"As parents, we all know how amazing Pine View is and what the teachers and staff do for our students," Stern said. "We're just thrilled that, when someone asks us to support something extra that will help our kids, we're able to step up and do so."

For the 2022-23 school year, PVA hopes to do even more, with an initiative that will provide broad-based support available to every student organization. Details will be provided early in the school year.

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




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

Pine View Science to Travel to International Space Station

Picture this: Around the end of the school year, likely in spring 2023, an experiment designed and built by Pine View students will blast off into space, destination International Space Station.

That image is courtesy of a program called the Student Spaceflight Experiments Program, which Pine View teachers Dylan Bell, Marie Rosander and David Yotsuda are bringing to campus this year.

"The SSEP program is a program that has successfully sent student-created experiments to the International Space Station for many years running, from students all around the world," said Bell, who teaches astronomy, Earth and space science.

"Normally this opportunity is sent out to large communities that encompass many schools within a district, but here at Pine View we are lucky enough, through the help of PVA and hopefully other donors, to isolate the community to just our school. This means that one team of students will have a guaranteed spot on the ISS where the experiment will be launched to dock with the ISS in the summer of next year 2023.

The program can involve virtually all Pine View students in some way. Students in Grades 2-12 are invited to design the "mission patch" – a staple of all NASA missions – while students in Grades 5-12 are invited to develop the actual experiment.

The teachers say the SSEP provides students with an invaluable opportunity.

"Students need to be exposed to more real life connections and this is a golden opportunity for them to be engaged and investigate something that they might not have done before," Rosander said. "I mean, how cool is it that one of our PV experiments will travel to the ISS!" Yotsuda said the project has relevance at varying grade levels. His Grade 8 Life Science students will apply their knowledge from science and their creative and academic abilities to write a science proposal and create an experimental design. He also hopes to inspire his Grade 6 Earth Space Science students and have them experience experimental design at an early age. "Even though some students will experience failure, it will be a learning opportunity to know that they can go back and rethink, redesign and rewrite for success," he said.

"Our students who participate in the experiment will learn a very vital skill, to write a scientific proposal," Rosander said. "They will be doing research and learning to fact-check, contacting scientists relevant to their investigation, communicating and collaborating with their team. They will understand that science is not done in isolation and we hope for collaboration between grade levels too."

For the project, Pine View will design and develop a mini-laboratory capable of supporting a single microgravity experiment to be transported to the ISS, something Bell knows a bit about: For his graduate research, Bell designed an experiment on the assembly of protein fibrils in microgravity, which flew on the ISS in 2015.

Because the ISS is in a state of constant freefall, Bell explained, it creates a seemingly weightless microgravity environment inside the spacecraft. "Any physical, chemical, or biological systems placed in this environment will behave as if gravity has been turned off," he said.

Bell said that means the SSEP experiment design is therefore driven by a single essential question: "What physical, chemical, or biological system would I like to explore with gravity seemingly turned off for a period of time, as a means of assessing the role of gravity in that system?"

The project is beginning almost immediately. The Mission Patch design will be due September 30, and the parameters and requirements have already been sent to all classrooms.

The experimental design phase will run from September 1 to November 4. Interested students will work on creating a research proposal and then submit it to the teaching team, which by mid-December will select the three best research proposals and send them to the SSEP team at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center. The NASA team chooses the project they deem most likely to succeed, and send the equipment for that winning team to begin creating their experiment.

Once it is completed, it goes to Houston for toxicology testing to ensure the experiment cannot accidentally damage the ISS or hurt the astronauts. It then gets placed on the payload of a rocket for an expected spring 2023 launch. The experiment will run on the ISS and later, the entire payload returns to Earth via a splashdown, and the Pine View team receives the experiment for data collection and analysis.

"I am so excited to be able to teach in this very engaged and hands-on way," Rosander said. "I can't wait to see what our students will come up with and to see one of our very own PV students experiment flying up to the ISS in 2023– I will be there!"

Named for a past president of the Pine View Association who was the first honoree the year her child graduated, this year's luncheon was held at the Point and was attended by Dr. Stephen Covert, PVA Board Members, and our honorees: Lydia Howard, whose son, David, was in the Class of 2022, and who helmed the School Store for four years. Lydia's background in business, her leadership skills, and her way of making volunteers and students feel supported helped the School Store grow in profits and fans year after year. 

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














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

Pine View Math Modeling Wins Top Awards

A team of Pine View students placed nationally in the prestigious and highly competitive Math-Works Math Modeling Challenge, taking first place in the Technical Computing category and third place overall.

The Pine View team was Nolan Boucher, Uday Goyat, John Holcomb, Max Rudin and Lisa Zhang. Mathematics teacher Mark Mattia is the team's coach.

Teams prepare for weeks for the Math Modeling Challenge, which is a one-day, 14-hour event. Organizers give a prompt to all the teams, which have to develop answers using whatever math, modeling, and programming skills they have.

This year, teams had to develop a response to the following prompt: Will the shift to remote work last and to what extent?

More than 2,700 students in the United States and the United Kingdom participated, with 612 teams submitting papers. The sponsors, Math-Works, a leading developer of mathematical

computing software, awarded 37 scholarship prizes totalling \$100,000.

After presenting their work at the finals in New York City, Pine View's team was awarded \$10,000 for the overall prize and \$3,000 for the computing prize.

The MC3 Math Modeling Challenge is organized and run by the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics (SIAM), an international society with more than 14,000 members, including applied and computational mathematicians and computer scientists, engineers, physicists, and other scientists.

"I'm so proud of the work our students put in and thrilled to see that work recognized with these awards," Coach Mattia said. "The team challenged themselves to apply their mathematical skills and to learn new programming and modeling techniques. They succeeded because they put in the effort."

Pine View Students Excel in the American Math Contest

Pine View hosted another American Math Contest (AMC) during the 2021-2022 school year. The AMC is a series of competitions in secondary school mathematics that determine the United States team for the International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO). The selection process takes place over the course of roughly four stages: AMC10/12, AIME, USA(J)MO, and MOP.

At Pine View, the contest was administered by Ms. Eida Padgett. About 30 students participated in either AMC 10 or AMC 12. Congratulations to Ben Jiang (6th grade), Prabhav Govindu (8th grade), Rui Jiang (9th grade), Nolan Boucher (11th grade) and Ricardo Prado (12th grade) for qualifying to participate in the American Invitational Mathematics Examination (AIME). Congratulations to Rui Jiang (9th grade) for qualifying to participate United States of America Junior Mathematical Olympiad (USJMO).

Students who have an interest or passion for mathematics and would like to participate in high school level math competitions are encouraged to join the High School Math Club this year.



Speech and Debate Goes to Nationals



Pine View Speech and Debate Club completed a successful season by sending a contingent of qualifying students to the NCFL Grand National Tournament in Washington, D.C. in May.

Two members of Pine View Speech and Debate Club excelled at national championship events in May and June.

Ray Min, a graduating senior, placed eighth in the nation in the Student Congress division at the Grand National Speech and Debate Tournament in Washington DC over Memorial Day Weekend. Aadi

Bhensdadia, a rising eighth-grader, placed third in the nation in the Student Congress division at the National Speech & Debate Association's Middle School Nationals Tournament, held online June 7-9.

In all, eight members of PVSD qualified and attended the Washington DC tournament. Krystal Tran also qualified in the Student Congress division and progressed to the final round with Min. Grace Johnson and Joanna Malvas qualified in DUO Interpretation, Peter Deverdzic and Nina Wasluk qualified in Public Forum Debate, Emre Muessemeyer qualified in Extemporaneous Speaking and Shalini Nair qualified in Original Oratory.

They were among 1,981 high school students from 400 schools in 29 states competing in the Grand National Speech and Debate Tournament, which is sponsored by the National Catholic Forensic League and was held live for the first time since 2019.

"Memorial Day weekend in our nation's capital has been such a treat and an experience of a lifetime," said Jym Froelich, PVSD's coach. "I wish to thank our loving staff and administration and our phenomenal support system – aka, PVA – for making these memories and incredible opportunities even possible."







On the next screen, scroll down and click the **Enroll** button again.




- B. Choose your County and School Type
