

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News from the Board Room

PVA Meeting Highlights from September


In his Principal's Report, Dr. Covert announced that 30 Pine View students were named National Merit Finalists and that Pine View's Biomedical Engineering Club was named Chapter of the Year for the United States. He also discussed the county School Board's plans to change from the Blackboard platform. The Schoology program is one option under consideration.

PVA Governance Committee chair presented a slideshow on board members' legal and ethical obligations. She reported that the PVA's internal Executive Committee election will be in February, and that new members will be elected at the April general meeting.

PVA members voted to approve several funding requests: \$1,000 for the Senior Class Breakfast, \$5,000 for the Senior Grad Bash, \$1,000 for the South Asian Cultural Club, up to \$25,000 to the Pine View Band depending on the group's need, and \$2,535.28 to the school administration for a PSAT preparation class series.

The Alumni Committee reported that its first social at Marina Jack was a success and that they are continuing to build out an alumni database and to recruit alumni as mentors and to conduct mock interviews for college.

The PVA board was entertained with a flute quartet performance by Mr. Mongillo's band students Cole Laudenslager, Gabrielle Cann, Simona Belilovskiy and Sophia Sanchez.

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Alumni Profile: Andrew Samson, Class of 1997

What were your favorite aspects of Pine View?

I started at Pine View in 2nd grade, so there are too many to list. I'll go with my Top 3. #1 is how both my classmates and teachers challenged me to work harder. Whenever I talk to parents who are thinking about sending their kids to Pine View, they usually say, "I've heard it's competitive." My response is,

"That's what makes it great!" I am a harder worker because I was surrounded by so many students and teachers who set such a high standard. When some of the other kids in 3rd grade were reading entire Beverly Cleary books in one night (...not an exaggeration), I knew I needed to step it up. #2 is the camaraderie with all my classmates. By the time I

graduated high school, I felt like everyone was an extended part of my family. We had grown up with each other, and I formed bonds with many of my classmates that have now lasted for decades. #3 was how Pine View celebrated individuality and allowed everyone to be themselves.

What are your fondest memories of Pine View?

They're all linked to my teachers, and again, there are too many to list here. Mrs. Janoff for giving the simplest feedback after reading my essays: "So?" I still hear her voice whenever I read back what I've written and realize that I failed to get to the point or say anything interesting. Mrs. Tyler for allowing us to get bonus points by writing any fact we had remembered on the back of our tests, encouraging us to memorize everything we could so we could score over 100. Mrs. Johnston for her simulations of famous historical events like the French Revolution, and her lightningfast wit. Mrs. Levy for her 2nd grade classes where we had a Pee-Wee Herman party, and where leprechauns somehow upended our classrooms around St. Patrick's Day. Dr. Malinsky for encouraging my love of trivia. Mrs. Kroll's famous happy-vs-sad parabola lesson. Mrs. Van Arsdale, Mrs. Lampkins, Mrs. Goacher, Mr. Krause, Mrs. Lovell and Mrs. Henry for supporting my interest in speech and writing, putting me on a path I've followed my entire life.

Where did life take you after Pine View?

I graduated from the University of Pennsylvania and moved to Los Angeles where I worked as a comedy writer, writing for The Muppets, the PBS series "WordGirl" and "The Showbiz Show with David Spade." Then I shifted to sports talk and became a producer at FS1's "The Herd." My wife Laura and I moved to Sarasota in 2019 with our two daughters. Currently, I work for The Volume, a sports media company, and produce "The Colin Cowherd Podcast."

How did Pine View prepare you for the real world?



Pine View taught me the value of hard work. When I got to Pine View in second grade, I found it intimidating to be around so many intelligent kids. But over time, I learned that I could... well, not match... but approach their level if I worked harder. My teachers and classmates showed me what real effort looks like, and I found

that I had more confidence in

myself when I put in that level of work. I carry that with me to this day. I've learned that if I'm faced with any assignment or project that seems impossible at first, with the proper amount of time and focus, I can become competent in any subject... unless that subject was 9th grade Biology. Then no amount of work could save me.

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SCHOOL SAFETY MEETING

PVA and Pine View hosted a School Safety and Security Information Night for parents and students on Sept. 21 in the school auditorium. Principal Dr. Stephen Covert introduced Pine View's School Resource Officer Eugene Williams, Sergeant Joseph Hayes, and District Schools Chief of Police Duane Oakes, who shared their extensive backgrounds and experience in law enforcement and community safety.

With the Uvalde school shooting and others fresh in parents' minds (the St. Louis, Mo., shooting occurred as this issue of *Pine Views* went to press), a main topic centered on the safety protocols that Pine View School has instituted to keep students, faculty, and staff informed and well protected.

Dr. Covert recalled a time when the school had no fences surrounding its more than 75 acres and said the school strives to keep everyone safe on the sprawling campus. Chief Duane Oakes took several questions: has there has ever been a shooting at the school (no), whether gates could be guarded during peak hours (Pine View's SRO, assistant principals, and aides are stationed at every gate before, during, and immediately after drop-off and pick-up times), and how parents can get more involved in building a safer community (PVA encourages volunteers in classrooms, at events, and in support roles throughout the year).

PVA Board member Camille Cline invited all attendees to get involved with PVA because the more members of the school community get to know one another, the safer all will be. Dr. Covert echoed Cline's comments and noted more Parent Information Nights are being planned on instructional topics, social and emotional support for gifted students, test-taking strategies and stress management for students.

The partnership between Pine View and PVA in hosting Parent Information Nights and town hall-style meetings has been in place for years. Events are on timely topics of interest, so parents can get important information and updates from experts and share their thoughts with the school and PVA. Pine View and PVA welcome input from students, parents, and community members on ways to improve upon the school's world-class education and environment for students.



PV Names Teachers of the Year

Pine View's Teacher of the Year is middle school science teacher Marie Rosander, selected by faculty members from a pool of finalists that also included Melissa Bennett from the elementary school and Charles Carney from the high school.

The finalists were recognized by the administrative team's Prize Patrol, which delivered balloons, flowers and a certificate to each teacher on September 26. "We are so happy for each of these amazing educators, and the incredibly positive impact they have had on Pine View students for years!" said Principal Dr. Stephen Covert.

the Sarasota County School District's Teacher of the Year process. She is in her fifth year teaching at Pine View and 15th year in county schools, but her teaching experience goes far beyond Florida.

Rosander was born and raised in Stockholm, Sweden, and later lived in Dubai with her husband and two oldest children. There, she began helping at the children's school and teaching at a Swedish school in that country.

"I have always been a lifelong learner, curious and an optimist at heart," she said. "I think I have been a teacher at heart my entire life but didn't realize until then that I could do some good by helping and supporting curious young minds, not just my own kiddos!"


When the family returned to Sweden, she started her teaching path at Stockholm University studying language and language development. She taught grades one through three at a multicultural school in Stockholm. "I had students who recently had arrived in Sweden as refugees from the war in Iraq, children who have seen death and loss and appreciated the small things in life that most of us take for granted. Experiences like those form and shape us," she said.

Rosander and her family moved to Sarasota in 2006, and her youngest daughter, Maxine, attended Pine View for grades two through 12, graduating in 2018. "Today my own kiddos are happy adults, and I have found myself



loving to immerse myself in all projects that bring that extra joy into teaching," she said.

This will be her students' second year learning about solar energy and building solar suitcases for refugee camps in Uganda, and she is co-organizer of a school-wide project to send an experiment to the International Space Station. "How cool is that?" she said. "I think seeing student's eyes lit up with excitement, taking charge of their own learning path, is truly inspiring and that's what I try to focus on when the outside noise gets too loud. I love being a teacher and being part of our PV community."



In September, Marie Rosander's sixth-grade Earth and Space Science students planted a Florida native wildflower garden located in the PV School Garden. Ms. Rosander and PVA won a grant award from the Florida Wildflower Association and were delighted to receive a shipment of seedlings ready to plant.

The wildflower garden includes Swamp milkweed (Asclepias perennis), Blue porterweed (Stachytarpheta jamaicensis), Beebalm (Monarda punctata), Tropical sage (Salvia coccinea), Blackeyed Susan (Rudbeckia hirta) and Muhly grass (Muhlenbergia capillaris).

The wildflower garden's location and role is significant. By hosting native species of insects and animals, the wildflower garden will support pollination for the school garden, including the food forest (installed in May 2022) bordering the wildflower garden.

"The trees and plants, like our tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, starfruit, cherries and avocados, all depend on pollinators if they are going to generate fruit and be productive," said Lesley Sachs, who runs the PV Garden Program for PVA. "We have to give pollinators food sources that they know and have evolved to consume if we want them to visit the garden," stated Sachs.

The Florida native wildflower garden is planted with 24

native swamp milkweed, the host plant for Monarch butterfly caterpillars. Ms. Rosander's students helped to get the milkweed off to a good start by applying mycorrhizal fungi and mulching the garden with pine needle straw. Sachs, along with students from the Garden Club, constructed a butterfly habitat house to help raise Monarchs.

"The PV School Garden contains many milkweed plants and is visited regularly by monarch butterflies

but we haven't been successful in raising caterpillars to the chrysalis stage," said Sachs. "With the addition of the Florida native wildflower garden and the adjacent butterfly house, I am optimistic



that we can help the endangered monarchs rebound and thrive on the PV campus."

"My students love visiting the garden and learning by being part of the garden," said Rosander. "After our last garden visit, one said, 'I can't wait to see the pollinators grow, and know that we did that!!'

PVA sponsors and runs the school garden. Students can visit during Open Garden hours from 12 noon to 2:30 PM), with the High School Garden Club (Wednesdays from 1:15 to 2:30 PM) and with their teachers for classroom visits.

30 Pine View Seniors Named National Merit Semifinalists

Thirty members of Pine View School's senior class were named semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program.

Nationwide, the program selected approximately 16,000 semifinalists, who are selected based on their scores when they take the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test as juniors. The nationwide pool of semifinalists represents less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors and includes the highest scoring entrants in each state.

Students chosen as semifinalists have the opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,250 National Merit Scholarships, worth nearly \$28 million, to be offered in the spring.

"Congratulations to them, and also to each and every teacher who supported, inspired, motivated, and provided the instruction to prepare them for this recognition," said Pine View School Principal Dr. Stephen Covert. Principal's Perspective

Dear Pine View School Parents and Community:

It seems like the year just began, and it's time for the Fall parade, the Pine View Fair, and then Thanksgiving Break is right around the corner! We are so happy to be back in school, and want to thank our high school students who volunteered to come and help with campus clean-up following Hurricane Ian. We had parents and teachers also volunteer, and a group of parents got lunch and snacks for all of our student volunteers- *that's going the extra degree*! We also had clubs on campus, as well as individual students and families, who raised money and donated to help those neighbors of ours to the south who were more seriously impacted than Pine View- *thank you*! Our campus only suffered

minimal damage, and we were able to clean up and repair the campus in short order. We recently had a record-breaking Astronomy Night with Pine View faculty member Dr. Dylan Bell and retired PV faculty member Chap Percival. It was scheduled for the new moon so that was the darkest time of the lunar cycle, and provided the best conditions for stargazing! There were many telescopes set up for viewing along the walkway at the Quad, and students and families also brought their own. The Astronomy Club provided free popcorn and waters, and a great time was had by all! Thank you to Dr. Bell and Chap Percival for making the evening a huge success- stay tuned for more dates, and *see you under the stars*!

Our Pine View students, in grades 2 through 12, have been taking beginning-of-the-year assessments, and many students have come home sharing their reactions to the new STAR, or FAST assessments, or even the PSAT, SAT, or ACT they may have taken. We post our testing calendars on our website, so if you want to see information relevant to your student, take a minute to look at the calendar. We also sent home copies of the assessment results, and for both STAR and FAST, specifically shared that these should not be interpreted as achievement results. All students at Pine View are likely to test extremely well, and likely demonstrate above grade level competency. Our students outperformed everyone in the district and the state, and are exactly where we would expect them to be. Our teachers are using these data points simply as a check-in for where the students are, and Progress Monitoring will continue throughout the year.

It is an honor and privilege to lead such an amazing school, and we are very fortunate that we were able to have recognized our National Merit Semifinalists at a recent School Board meeting, partnered with the Jewish Federation of Sarasota-Manatee in interviewing and recording the stories of Holocaust survivors, and creating resource materials and videos for teachers throughout Sarasota County with the help of students and PV faculty Chris Lenerz and Mark Goebel, and partnering with our School Advisory Council (SAC), for our annual Veterans' Day celebration. These are just a few of the almost endless list of amazing programs and initiatives that serve to create a special place where we nurture the growth of gifted learners- in partnership with you. Oftentimes, "the negative" or "the noise" is what gets talked about or what we may see on social media - *but the reality is that we have amazing teachers who pour their hearts and souls into lifting up and preparing our students, incredibly supportive parents and community members, and absolutely wonderful students for whom we all dedicate everything we do! We encourage all Pine View parents, and community members to be the stronger, heard, share your voices, and to share the messages of success and achievement- "Working as One for the Success of All!"*

- 4. Read this page thoroughly and then click on "CLICK HERE TO REGISTER"
- 5. Click on "STUDENTS APPLYING FOR THE FIRST TIME CLICK HERE"
- 6. Read thoroughly and then click on "Go to STEP 1"
- 7. Read thoroughly and check the box that states that you have reviewed the document
- 8. Click on "Go to STEP 2"
- 9. Create your account by completing the demographic information and click "Next"
- 10. Include AT LEAST ONE community service organization in the left-hand column
- 11. Complete information for the "Service" column on the right and click "SUBMIT"

Ms. Halcomb, Ms. Manders, or Ms. Byington will go online and approve the applications.

Follow the following steps once all has been approved:

- 1. Follow steps 1-4 from above
- 2. This time click on "STUDENTS WHO HAVE ALREADY APPLIED "CLICK HERE"
- 3. Your username is your N number. Your password is our school number "0021"
- 4. Please print out the log sheets. They will be pre-populated with the organization(s) which you have selected for your volunteer time/hours
- 5. Once you have completed 100 hours of community service, please return the completed log sheets, along with the "Community Service Plan and Evaluation Form" to the guidance office. These hours will be placed onto your transcript and will automatically be plcked up for eligibility for the Bright Futures Scholarship.

The "Community Service Plan and Evaluation Form" can be printed and completed by logging into the community service system (using directions above) and clicking on the community organizations you have chosen for your hours.

*Community service hours are required for certain scholarships, such as the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship. They are not required to meet eligibility for high school graduation.

*Community service hours earned no longer equate to .5 or 1 credit on high school transcripts.


