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

As your newly elected PVA President, I wanted to take a moment to introduce myself. My name is Puja Dhanraj and I am a proud Pine View parent and alumna (Class of 1998). I started at Pine View in 4th grade at the old campus - we moved to the current campus when I was in 8th grade.

After Pine View, I went to the University of Pennsylvania / Wharton School for my undergraduate education, where I met my husband, Chris, and also completed my MBA at Wharton immediately after college. I had a 10+ year career at a private equity firm in New York

City and lived in Westport, CT for 10 years. Our family moved back to Sarasota in 2020 and I joined the PVA Board in February 2021. Our two children, Alexander and Annabelle, are both students at Pine View in 7th grade and 4th grade, respectively, and I couldn't be happier that they both now have the opportunity to experience the magic of Pine View for themselves!

Over the past number of weeks, I have engaged with many parents about the various ways that the PVA has supported the school in the past and how we can best support the school going forward. Given this dialogue, PVA plans to focus its initiatives on three distinct areas: Academic Support & Partnerships, College & Career Counseling and Community & Culture Building.

With respect to Academic Support and Partnerships, PVA has supported clubs and organizations on campus, sponsored Faculty and Staff Appreciation events, provided Agenda Books to our students and much more. In addition to continuing to support these kinds of endeavors, we are also hoping to invest in STEM initiatives across all three schools and help renovate the elementary school playground area in the future.

In the College & Career Counseling area, PVA helped to fund our College & Career Advisor for grades 8-11 and funded a "boot camp" for the PSAT last fall. Going forward, we hope to expand the "boot camps" for standardized testing to include all of the PSAT, SAT and ACT and continue to offer it free of charge to students. Additionally, we hope to bring in speakers to help parents and students understand the nuances of the college application process.

Finally, and arguably, most importantly, we want to work with parents to continue to build the Pine View community and culture. We hope, together, that we can figure out ways for our kids to foster relationships with their peers outside of the classroom. The Pine View family is truly unique and incredibly special - the amazing faculty, staff, administrators, parents and students that have come before us have given us an incredible foundation on which we can continue to build. My years as a student at Pine View gave me some of the greatest friends and memories in my life, while the skills and education I gained helped me to take on new challenges with confidence. I hope that all of your children come away from their Pine View experience saying the same thing.

I am looking forward to working with all of you to find ways to support our Pine View community and continuing its long-standing tradition of excellence! PVA Elects New Leadership Team

At its February meeting, the Pine View Association's Board of Directors elected a new slate of officers: President, Puja Dhanraj; Vice President of School Support, Jaime Heath; Vice President of Sponsorship, Silke Cuff; Vice President of Communications, Debbi Wolfinger; Treasurer, Gretchen Lovewell; Secretary, Dave Gulliver.

The new officers begin in their roles immediately and serve until February 2024. The terms reflect a recent change in PVA bylaws intended to let the new officers get "on the job" guidance from their predecessors.

Dhanraj, the new president, said she hoped to see PVA focus on building more support of academic programs and college and career counseling, and do more to foster Pine View culture and a sense of community in each grade level. (See President's Letter, page 9)

Dhanraj is a Pine View graduate (1998) who started at the school in fourth grade on the original campus. She and her husband Chris are the parents of two Pine View students, Alexander (seventh grade) and Annabelle (fourth grade). She is an elementary school parent representative and most recently served as vice president of school support.

Heath and her husband, Dennis Pinna, are the parents of a sixth grader and fourth grader at Pine View and a two-year-old at Forty Carrots. She is an elementary school parent representative and also serves as PVA's technology administrator.

Cuff is an elementary school parent representative. She and her husband Derek are parents of a son in fifth grade and a daughter in third grade. She has served as the vice president of sponsorship for the past year and has served as chair or co-chair of PVA's Peramathon and Python 5K events.

Wolfinger has been connected to Pine View for 26 years, when her husband Scott, a high school history teacher, began teaching here. They are the parents of Brooke (tenth grade) and Tyler (seventh grade). She is a high school parent representative and is continuing in the role of Communications vice president, after previously serving as secretary.

Lovewell and Chad are parents of seventh grader Raleigh. She joined PVA in 2020 and is a middle school parent representative. She is continuing her role as the chair of the Funding Request Committee in addition to serving as treasurer.

Gulliver and his wife Darla are parents of eleventh graders Devin and Quinn. He is a high school parent representative, editor of *Pine Views* magazine and previously served as chair of the Governance committee.

All of the officers were elected unanimously by the full PVA board. Together, the officers compose PVA's executive board, which oversees PVA operations and reports to the membership at the annual meeting in April.


PVA To Hold General Membership Meeting and Board Elections

Pine View Association will have its annual Membership Meeting on Tuesday, April 11, in the Student Union. PVA's officers and committee chairs will present reports on the year's activities, and the Governance Committee will conduct an election of new members.

The election will fill seven open parent representative seats on the PVA Board of Directors. PVA's bylaws require the Board to try to achieve balanced representation of five parent directors for each level of the school. For this election, PVA seeks to fill two open seats for elementary school, two for middle school, and three for high school. One elementary position and one middle school position are to fill unexpired one-year portions of terms created by resignations of Board members. All other positions are for three-year terms.

To run for a Board position, a person must be a registered member of PVA and submit the **self-nomination form** (*on the back of this page of Pine Views; also available in the school office*) to the Pine View School office by the end of day on March 31. Candidates will be expected to give a three-minute talk at the election about why they are running for the Board and what their goals as a Board member would be.

All Pine View parents are invited to the meeting, and all registered members of PVA are eligible to vote in the election.

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Lisa Stern: A Treasure to Pine View School for the Gifted

Pine View Association President Emerita Lisa Stern, mother of Noah, Isabel, and Mia, greeted me with a smile like she always does, one that encompasses her entire face and makes her eyes shine. She enjoys people and I was lucky to be her friend first and then later worked with her as a leader of Pine View.

We started discussing how Lisa and her kids connected with Pine View School. She told me that when Noah was designated as gifted, they visited Fruitville Elementary's Gifted Program and Pine View's classes to observe. Noah didn't hesitate. He picked PVS. Its structured, nurturing atmosphere engaged him and he liked that he could feel independent and safe while on such big campus. He was excited to be on such a large campus exerting his independence.

Noah, who graduates from Pine View this May, began in Mrs. Magenheim's Second Grade class in 2012. Lisa was very involved in Mrs. Magenheim's class and would work with small groups on reading, math, and history discussion nearly every day.

When Isabel started at PVS two years later, Lisa served as Classroom Mom in Mrs.

Herschberger's Second Grade class, a great transition to coming in from a different school. They found Mrs. Herschberger very supportive and compassionate.

A year later, Mia also had Mrs. Herschberger for Second Grade. Lisa taught the Junior Achievement module, covering career choices and basic financial literacy, like handling and counting money. With three kids all in PV Elementary—Noah in 5th, Isabel in 3rd, and Mia in 2nd—Lisa was busy! She chaperoned trips throughout their elementary years including St. Augustine, Kennedy Space Center, Riverview Planetarium, Myakka River State Park and Biz Town.

It was when Isabel was in Fifth Grade that Lisa decided she wanted to learn more about Pinnacle, PVA's largest fundraising gala of the year. A PVA Board Member connected her with the Pinnacle Chair, who encouraged Lisa to create artwork with Isabel's class to auction off at Pinnacle. They made a bowl with every student's thumbprint transformed into little people representing each child in the class. The bowl was auctioned off and made money to support the classroom.

Around that time, PVA, a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization—not a PTO—needed a new Treasurer. President Emerita Isa Chauhan and her board elected Lisa to serve as Board Member and Treasurer in November 2018. As Treasurer, Lisa worked closely with Pine View Bookkeeper Teri Fisher, business partners, sponsors, major donors, and our board accountant in maintaining the accuracy and integrity of PVA's financials. It was a big job, but Lisa was up to the challenge. The board always had faith in her ability to juggle so many accounts and payments to vendors, clubs, and organizations.

By February of 2020, Lisa had taken on the dual role of Treasurer and Vice-President of School Support, due to a transition the board was making to the timing of Executive Committee elections. In May 2020, Lisa Stern was elected President. All PVA Board positions are unpaid. Lisa, who also worked full-time while raising three kids, gave it her all. Her attention to detail and care for the school is unparalleled.

Lisa says that the accomplishments she is proudest of are the relationships she has helped to foster through the pandemic and post-pandemic, rebuilding PVA to its strongest board yet, growing programs despite so many setbacks thanks to COVID, and working closely with Pine View Principal Dr. Stephen *(continued on page 15)*

Covert. I have had a front-row seat to Lisa's drive, decision making, and dedication and can say unequivocally that she has a real knack for identifying, cultivating, training, and managing terrific volunteers, committee chairs, and board members. She has also worked hard to open gateways for parents to communicate with her and the PVA board.

As Noah graduates in May and Mia starts her Ninth Grade year in fall 2023, Lisa looks forward to helping with Pinnacle, which she has supported for many years, culminating in receiving the highest honor PVA bestows on its Pinnacle Chairs—the Silver Pinecone. Thanks to the energy and efforts of a fantastic team, Lisa said that Pinnacle raised close to \$200,000 in February 2023.

A PVA President will see more than half a million dollars roll through the organization's coffers in a year. With these gifts of generosity from all of you, Lisa envisions more opportunities for students in the classrooms. She wants Pine View School for the Gifted to remain the Number-One School in Florida and stay competitive which can be a challenge at times due to budget constraint, but a goal that PVA can help the school achieve.

News from the Board Room

January Meeting (1/10/2023)

Lilly Thomas, chair of the Pine View Fair, presented her report on the November 12 event, which raised \$28,000 overall; after expenses (inflatables, dunk tank, sno-cones, etc.), more than \$22,000 was distributed to clubs and teachers. A survey on Fair planning and execution received an overall positive response and included some areas for improvement.

Principal Dr. Stephen Covert presented his report, which included:

Pine View will add a new Advanced Placement class next year, AP Pre-Calculus.

All classrooms now have a four-button panel that allow teachers (or students, if instructed) to use in case of various emergencies.

Enrollment is currently at 1,689 and is near capacity in the high school. Overall capacity is 2,250 total. Applications have increased sharply.

Puja Dhanraj, an alumna and PVA vice president, and PVA Alumni Rep Manav Malik reported that 40 attended an alumni event, featuring an archives and Building 17 tour, with a Jazz Band performance. The event connected alums with current students.

VP of Sponsorship Silke Cuff said sponsorships had raised \$104,000 to date and that she was working on plans for Peramathon (March 10) and Python 5K Run (April 15).

VP of Communications Debbi Wolfinger sent an e-blast to PVA members, with a calendar of upcoming events, including Pinnacle, and a survey about communications.

The PVA Board heard three funding requests:

Sara Kolsky, third grade teacher, with students Shay Sachs, Brady Rigopoulos and Logan Stanley, asked for \$3,000 to support the Third Grade Showcase drama and writing program (total cost, \$4,800). The students shared their favorite aspects of the show planning and execution.

Teacher Jym Froelich, coach of Pine View Speech and Debate club, and club President Rafeh Khan presented a request for \$10,000 to support coaching and tournament expenses (total club budget \$68,000). The club has been highly successful, with members winning local, regional, state and national competitions. It also has grown exponentially, from 31 members pre-pandemic to more than 200 now.

Garden Chair Lesley Sachs and PV Middle School Art Teacher Haley Brown asked for funds for an Artist Garden that would also honor the late eighth grade student Lilly Glaubach. The garden would be outside Ms. Solomon and Ms. Brown's classrooms and would include flowers, sculpture and be a site for both art classes and relaxation. They requested \$3,000 (of \$8,000 total cost, with \$3,000 already raised).

The PVA Board voted unanimously to fund all three proposals at the full amount requested.

News from the Board Room

February Meeting (2/13/23)

The Volunteer Breakfast will be held in April to thank all our volunteers.

Pinnacle's four-minute video was shared with the board. IT Chair Jaime Heath was encouraged to add it to the website.

Survey by Board Member and Faculty & Staff co-Chair Jill Izydor received 92 responses (40 viewable).

55% would like to receive targeted information. 82% prefer email over text or phone and prefer to receive monthly communications.

President Lisa Stern shared the Pinnacle report. Early figures of \$227,000 raised from ticket sales, auctions and the paddle raise, with costs of about \$75,000 for the venue and decorations, for a total of \$152,000 raised for Pine View.

Lisa Stern thanked several people for contributions to the event: VP Sponsorship Silke Cuff for the incredible paper flower sculptures; Pine View teachers for the artwork contributed by students; PVA Board Member Ben Turoff for behind-the-scenes work.

Faculty & Staff Appreciation co-Chair Jill Izydor shared that Faculty & Staff Appreciation Week will be the week of April 24. The days' offerings will include a taco bar, a Thai food bar, a Chick-fil-A bar and an ice cream bar. Faculty & Staff Appreciation co-Chair Andrea Berke said that various other food trucks will be available. She will be recruiting volunteers.

VP Sponsorship Chair Silke Cuff said that Peramathon fundraising is starting, and that top prizes will include an Apple watch, a 3D printer and an electric bike. Python 5K will also have funds raised from sponsors, and some 400 runners are expected.

Alumni Rep Manav Malik shared that on March 30 Mr. Bowermeister will be coming back after 23 years to conduct a performance, followed by an alumni event in the Student Union. Mr. Bowermeister pioneered all the musical groups at Pine View. (See advertisement on pages 2-3)

The PVA Board held an election for its new Executive Board officers. Board members voted by secret ballot and unanimously elected the following: Secretary, David Gulliver;

Treasurer, Gretchen Lovewell; Vice President of Communications, Debbi Wolfinger; Vice President of School Support, Jaime Heath; Vice President of Sponsorships, Silke Cuff; President, Puja Dhanraj

Governance chair Camille Cline presented President Emerita Lisa Stern with a "PVA President" gavel on behalf of a grateful PVA Board for her leadership over the past 18 months.

SAP Info Corner: Food, Mood, and Attitude

We know our Pine View students are extraordinary, and often have extraordinary expectations and pressures to navigate in the tricky and taxing teen years. Though gifted students are not more likely to experience anxiety and depression, gifted kids do tend to experience the world with greater intensity, which may mean the symptoms of anxiety, such as a content of the anxious thoughts may be experienced at a deeper intensity.

While there are many approaches to managing these conditions, such as medication and therapy, in the face of hectic schedules, hardened habits, and (in all honesty) exhaustion and convenience, the role of diet in managing depression and anxiety can be easily overlooked. However, recent research has shown and continues to make the case that the food we eat can have a significant impact on our mental health.

Many studies have found that people who consume a diet that is high in processed and refined foods, such as sugary snacks, fast food, and processed meats, are more likely to experience symptoms of depression and anxiety.

On the other hand, those who consume a diet that is rich in whole foods, such as fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and lean protein, are less likely to experience these symptoms.

Why? Because the food we eat affects the chemical balance in our brains, which can impact our mood and emotions. For example, across the general population, research has shown that a diet that is high in sugar and processed foods can lead to inflammation in the body. This internal inflammation has been linked to an increased risk of depression and anxiety. On the other hand, a diet rich in anti-inflammatory foods, such as leafy greens and berries, can help reduce inflammation and improve mood, concentration, and focus in kids, teens, and adults alike.

Further, for our Pine View students who may be living with dual exceptionality, such as giftedness and ASD or giftedness and ADD/ADHD (or the trifecta!), foods which would typically be considered "anti-inflammatory," such as whole grain breads and yogurts, may actually be inflammatory due to gluten and casein sensitivities often experienced by students with the above expressions of neurodiversity. The resulting discomfort makes self-regulation, focus, concentration, social skills, and memory that much more challenging.

This chain of catalysts and consequences can be challenging to relate to if we've not experienced it. Many of us reason, "physiology is physiology and feelings are feelings." However, if we think back to the last time we had a fever and think about how we felt - our energy, our interest-level, our mood, our social engagement... wasn't our peak performance, right? Exactly - our bodies didn't feel comfortable, and it affected our emotional and mental state. For young people who regularly eat foods that cause inflammation, their bodies may unpredictably feel funny or uncomfortable, but it's *(continued on page 19)*

so familiar it seems normal. These students may be trying to cope with the impact of this invisible inflammation, and unable to articulate why their mood and school performance varies so much from day to day.

Now, parents often get a bit uneasy at this point as our middle memory turns with questioning inward eyes toward the heap of frozen pizza boxes in the recycling (or is that just my house?), and, as a result, any interest in a new or resurgent approach to mental health support in the shape of nourishment may be quietly yet quickly crushed under a pile of overwhelm with a dash of guilt. Whoa, team and fear not! The time for looking backward and allowing our (potential) anxiety over past choices, or even present choices (such as supporting local ice cream vendors... again, just me?) obstruct us from bringing awareness, consciousness, and intentionality to the fuel we are using to power our and our students' internal engines.

Which brings us to the challenge - the challenge to change! As so much of what we do is unconscious already and thus feels deeply entrenched, thinking about making a dietary change can feel overwhelming and the returns not worth the effort. Now who does that sound like... hmmm... oh yes! Our students! This is how they feel about schoolwork at times. What do we tell them? Calm down, relax... take it one assignment at a time (or perhaps some say, "quit complaining and get it done already!" - either way, these are words of

inspiration!). Thus, we are powered by our own advice when it comes to behavior change - we are always just one step from progress, and when we take that step we enact progress that cannot be taken from us.

We can help support our students' mental health with nutrition one plate, one snack, or even one bite at a time. Stay aware of how the body feels, resist the emotionally-fueled frenzy through the Publix aisles, find other things to laugh about with your teenager other than the amount of ice cream in your cart. I hear these "cat" videos are sweeping the nation.

In all seriousness and in conclusion, the food we eat, or the "fuel" we put in our engines, has a significant impact on our mental health. While there is no one-size-fits-all diet that is guaranteed to alleviate depression and anxiety, research has shown that consuming a diet that is rich in whole foods and low in processed foods can help manage these conditions for the general population, and for students and adults with neurodivergence, a more targeted and researched anti-inflammatory diet can make a powerfully positive impact. Bringing consciousness and intentionality to our fueling process, such as increasing the availability of omega-3 rich proteins and leafy greens, and reducing the intake of refined sugars, and empty starches, we make powerful progress toward improving our students' (and our own!) mental health and wellbeing.











Pine View Band Plays to Crowds On and Off Campus

Pine View's Band students played some of their biggest shows of the year. More than 90 students from grades 6 through 12 performed to a crowd of 200-plus guests at Encore, the band's fundraising gala, at the Casey Key Resort. The Pine View Jazz Band performed its annual Jazz Under The Stars concert, on the campus lawn, in February, playing 18 numbers from Miles Davis, Ella Fitzgerald and Carlos Jobim over the 90-minute show.

And the nearly 50 members of the Wind Ensemble performed at the Florida Bandmasters Association's regional Music Performance Assessments at Riverview High School. Under the direction of Band teacher Victor Mongillo, the Wind Ensemble, Pine View's highest-level band, was judged as Superior – the association's highest rating – in every category. It was at least the third consecutive year the Wind Ensemble has received perfect scores.

The Wind Ensemble and Jazz Band will travel to Orlando in late March for the WorldStrides national competition and all levels of Band will perform their spring concerts in May.





Elementary School Report

Pine View's 2nd graders spent a day at Historic Spanish Point looking at middens and life at Spanish Point from the past.



Third graders made their own harmonicas out of popsicle sticks, rubber bands, and straws during our study of sound energy, and played with the position of straws to experience the change in pitch with shortened and lengthened sound waves.



In math, 3rd graders worked in groups to order fractions on a number line and used benchmark fractions and fraction equivalents to justify their answers. Third graders also visited Mote Marine to study sea life.

High School Report

Roma Jagdish's AP Human Geography class has been learning about chocolate as a way of understanding the world. Students first learn the history of chocolate, the different types of it worldwide, and the connection between chocolate and trade. The students also taste-tested four types of chocolate of varying cacao content and then filled out a rubric using a "Chocolate Wheel." The lesson brings attention to cacao as a plantation crop and raises awareness of child labor, deforestation, and slavery.





Haley Brown's high school level Theatre class are preparing for their spring show. This spring, they will perform "Minecraft the Musical," for which they wrote the dialogue, music and lyrics themselves.

In William Mancera's Spanish 5 class, students gave presentations requiring them to write a commercial for the radio, describing a specialty





SSEP Update: Mission Patches Selected, Experiment Progresses
