News from the Board Room

The Pine View Association Board of Directors met in January and February. The following are highlights of the meetings.

January:

The Board heard a presentation from Lisa Bechtold, executive director of the Sarasota chapter of Take Stock in Children. The mentoring program serves 380 students county-wide, including 11 at Pine View, and offers scholarships to students completing the program. Parents interested in learning more about the program or about becoming mentors should contact Bechtold at lisa@takestocksarasota.org.

PVA Treasurer Gretchen Lovewell presented a report on PVA's finances and noted that moving PVA funds to a higher-yield account brought in about \$1,700 in interest income in one month.

The Board heard a request from Languages teachers Judit Pauling, Dean Ball and Maggie Higgins for \$21,000 to purchase Vista Higher Learning textbooks and workbooks, which are much more appropriate for gifted student education than the district's standard textbook line. The Board agreed the books were worthwhile but after learning that a multi-year purchase could be more cost-effective, the Board asked the Pine View administration for more information and a revised request.

The Board approved a request from the student club Business Professionals of America for \$1,500 to partially fund the cost of attending the BPA State Leadership Conference in Orlando, and also approved a request from teacher Sara Kolsky for \$1,500 for the annual Third Grade Showcase event.

The Board also heard a request from the Class of 2024 for \$11,710 to defray costs of the graduation ceremony, senior breakfast, and class trip. The Class has already raised more than \$32,000, and the PVA funding will go first to support students who need financial assistance. The Board approved the request.

Peramathon Committee chairs Silke Cuff, Lindsay Sweeting and Katie Padgett reported that Peramathon was immensely successful, raising more than \$56,000 and with expenses of just over \$9,000 being well under the event budget of \$12,500.

The Board discussed plans for the Pine View 55th Anniversary event, scheduled for April 12 (see story on page 15) and approved allocating \$2,500 to the event to make tickets more affordable for the entire Pine View community.



February:

The Board approved a request from Pine View Principal Dr. Stephen Covert for \$9,879 to fund about half of the cost of a new marquee sign for the school entrance, which would have higher resolution, the ability to display video and wireless connectivity.


The Board approved a request from teacher Shannon Wynne for \$5,912.63 to purchase updated equipment, including a camera, computer and Tricaster production system for Pine View News.

Jaime Heath, PVA's vice president of school support, reported that the Pinnacle gala raised about \$240,000 before expenses, which were still being finalized.

The Board elected its officers for the coming year: Puja Dhanraj, president; Silke Cuff, vice president of sponsorship; Jaime Heath, vice president of school support; Debbi Wolfinger, vice president of communications; Dana Moretta, recording secretary; Wendy Teague, treasurer.

PVA To Hold General Membership Meeting and Board Elections

The Pine View Association will have its annual Membership Meeting at 6:00 PM Tuesday, April 16, in the Student Union. PVA's officers and committee chairs will present reports on the year's activities, and the Elections Committee will conduct an election for members of the PVA Board of Directors.

The election will fill seven open parent representative seats on the Board. Five seats are for full three-year terms. Two seats are for one-year terms, replacing Board members resigning before their term was complete.

Under PVA's bylaws, the Board seeks to achieve balanced representation of five parent directors from each level of the school. For this election, PVA seeks to fill two open seats for elementary school representatives, four for middle school representatives, and one for a high school representative. The Elections Committee coordinates candidates and school level seats.

To run for a Board position, a person **must** be a registered and approved member of PVA at the time of the meeting, and **must** submit the self-nomination form (on page 11 of this issue of *Pine Views* and also available in the school office) to PVA via mail or in person to the Pine View School office by close of business on Monday, April 1. Candidates will be expected to speak for up to three minutes at the election about why they are running for the Board and what their goals as a Board member would be.

All members of the Pine View community are invited to the meeting, and all registered members of PVA are eligible to vote in the election.

Mr. Maron, another 4th grade teacher, thinks that this is a terrific way for children to work while having fun. He says, "Wonderful experience for youth to learn responsibility and be productive."

At 10:13 a.m, Mrs. Bennett, a 5th grade teacher, describes the whole process as "happy chaos." Ms. Barber, another 5th grade teacher who is retiring after this year shares, "I am excited for the new phase of life, and I am not sad that it's over, just grateful for 22 years of teaching at Post Office."

Ms. Abeysekera, a 3rd grade teacher, thinks that the Post Office is a wonderful opportunity for the children to work together. At 10:29 a.m., she says, "Going beautifully, it is a day to show that the students care about each other, and they are being very



respectful." Mrs. Fox, another 3rd Grade teacher, says, "It is chaotic, but it feels like the kids have a learning experience." It seems that both 3rd grade teachers feel that this is a learning opportunity for their students.

By just before 11:00 a.m. the chaos is over. All 10,000plus Valentines have been delivered!

Everyone loves Valentine's Day Post Office, and some great times happen during this wonderful event. Mrs. Simon (who used to be a 4th grade teacher) created the Post Office many years ago, and ever since then, it has always been an exciting time for both elementary students and teachers.



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Elementary Student Council, the service club for Grades 4 and 5 sponsored by Ms. Kolsky, participates in the Mayor's Food Drive each November to collect money to help families in need during the holiday season.

The club made a deal with Elementary Principal Mr. Sprinkle: If members collected over \$2,000 for the cause, they could "slime" him. The club met its goal, with Ms. Abeysekera's class contributing the most money. Mr. Sprinkle kept his word, and on Thursday March 7, Ms. Abeysekera's class, Ms. Kolsky and her student council conducted the sliming!

Pine View Bands Score Top Marks in Competitions and Reviews

Pine View School's bands, under the direction of Victor Mongillo, took home top ratings this month in the Florida Bandmasters Association's Music Performance Assessments (MPAs).

At the MPAs, the bands play three pieces that they have prepared in advance, and then in the "sight reading" section, they play two pieces they have never seen before. A panel of judges assess the bands on a broad array of criteria and then give them a rating.

On March 1, the Wind Ensemble performed for the MPAs, held at Riverview High School. The MPA judges rated the band as "Superior," the association's top ranking, in all assessment categories. On March 8, the Middle School Symphonic Band also performed at the MPAs and like their high school counterparts, also received "Superior" ratings across the board.

"Every judge, including the sight-reading judges, recognized what great performances these groups achieved," Mr. Mongillo said.

In February, the Pine View Jazz Band competed in the Jazz Club of Sarasota's "Battle of the High School Bands." Evaluated by professional jazz musicians and instructors, the Pine View band took first place over bands from Booker High School and Riverview High School.

And in early March, Pine View also had 15 students selected to the Gulf Coast Honor Band. "I am incredibly proud every year of the outstanding achievements by our young musicians!" Mr. Mongillo said.

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
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
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20 Members of Pine View Speech & Debate Qualify for National Championships

Pine View's Speech & Debate Team excelled at two spring tournaments that serve as qualifiers for the championships of two national debating leagues.





8th grade ELA students had a busy January building historical context for their quarter 3 novel, To Kill a Mockingbird. Students honed their writing skills with an expository essay and journal responses to the novel, and participated in activities including identifying and analyzing characters and conducting small group discussions that explored the exposition of TKAM.



Students in Grade 6 Earth & Space science were busy learning about the Universe and of course spent lots of time in Pine View's Star Lab! They did a fun lifecycle CER (claim, evidence, reasoning) lab where students picked the materials they used based upon if it was a low or high mass star.





Middle School Report Compiled by Edwin Stumpf

Grade 6 World History completed their Ancient China unit and celebrated the Chinese Lunar New Year, the Year of the Dragon. Students were introduced to the DBQ (document-

based question), a technical process of analyzing primary and secondary sources (maps, letters, charts, poems, etc.) and using those documents as evidence to support a position they take when answering a question in a five-paragraph essay. This builds skills for when students are presented with DBQs in later grades and high school AP courses. Here, students are collaborating and organizing ideas for the question "The Great Wall of Ancient China: Was it Worth the Costs?"





Grade 6 celebrated Literacy Week by making bookmarks and participating in a school wide D.E.A.R. (Drop Everything And Read) period, bringing blankets and favorite books to read outside on a beautiful day!

AP French students created and delivered presentations in which they expounded upon the first three of the six themes to be covered on the exam. They explored in depth La Famille et la Communauté (The Family and Community), La Quête de Soi (The Search for Oneself), and L'esthétique (The Aesthetic). Each student chose an African country that has French as one of its official languages. They were required to speak entirely in French and develop an engagement activity utilized to assess the comprehension of their classmates.





Ms. Suchora's AP Pre-Calculus students finished their unit circle projects, which turned out amazing, she said: "We have really creative students at Pine View!



Ms. McLeod reports that in AP World History, students created review games for their midterm, and also attended Napoleon's funeral, having to portray a contemporary and act accordingly (depending upon that contemporary's relationship to Napoleon.)

In the second performance task for AP Seminar, Ms. Loyer reports that students had to read seven stimulus sources and select a thematic connection between at least two of them to inspire a research question, which they investigate and then turn into a written argument. They read and analyzed the sources and then made a chart finding specific connections between each pair. We take those connections and make them physical in a College Board-recommended activity, the "yarn conspiracy board." Students work in pairs or teams to set up posters around the room representing each source. As they share connections between sources, they add them to their posters and toss a ball of yarn to show which sources have been connected so far.





Beauty and the Beast

In January, Pine View Drama Club proudly presented a student production of Disney's "Beauty and the Beast." This musical incorporated students from grades 7 to 12 in all aspects of production. "From running the technical booth, to directing, to performing (and so much more) our students outdid themselves in all areas of this production!" Ms. O'Mahony said. Look for the club's tribute to Shakespeare coming in April.
