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

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




#### **FABULOUS GARDEN NEWS!**

Dear Pine View School Parents and Community:

What an amazing start to our fall weather in Sarasota, Florida! Pine View School wants to express how grateful we are for the incredible support and enthusiasm we have received with the start of the year, our elementary and high school parent coffees, and our "Supercharging Gifted Education" parent/teacher Saturday workshops! Pine View's success is predicated on an amazing PVA and our parents supporting the incredible teaching and learning in our classrooms, so thank you!



In this message, I will begin with some kudos to our amazingly successful students, and the teachers and parents who prepare them for high achievements. We received our ACT schoolwide scores from last year and they are among the highest they have ever been in the history of the school, and among the highest in the nation! The English, Reading, and Science subtests all increased in overall mean scores, as did the overall Composite score to an astounding 30.3, which is also an increase over last year's success! Way to go the extra degree, Pine View!

We want to share an update regarding safety and security and construction. The Main Office is coming along, and we are projecting a completion date in mid- to late-January. Building 11 (Purple Building) is coming along on-schedule and we hope to move our teachers back in over winter break. There are some new fenced areas on campus, you may have noticed. This is to give us the ability to section off the public park/play fields on the north end of campus from the academic areas on the south part of campus at night and on weekends. What they installed so far is not completed, and there may be some changes to allow for golf cart ingress and egress for emergencies, but these upgrades should be done in a month.

The Legacy Garden is a concept for us to commemorate the 50<sup>th</sup> birthday this year of Pine View, and recognize some of the early giants on whose shoulders Pine View students and community stand today. We are working with parents, faculty, and the PV50 committee on details and will share via the website and Remind.com, but mark November 19<sup>th</sup> on your calendars!

## Attendance Information

#### <u>Attendance Information Sheet – Please Keep!</u>

Your student's attendance information can be viewed on the 'FAMILY ACCESS PORTAL'

#### **ALL ABSENCES** (Including those for religious observance)

For an absence to be considered **excused**, one of the following must be submitted to the front office **within 3 days** of a student's return to school:

- 1. <u>AN ABSENT NOTE</u> The note must include your child's first and last name (please use the name that was used at registration), their grade, the **reason** for the absence and a parent/guardian signature.
- 2. A DOCTOR NOTE Please be sure your child's full name is on the note.
- 3. <u>PASSPORTS</u> can be used to excuse a **future** absence. At least **3** days prior to a known **full** day absence, your student should bring a note signed by a parent/guardian to the front office requesting a passport. This note is attached to the passport which is then signed by all teachers and a parent/guardian before being returned to the front office for administrative review. The passport is not excused until reviewed and approved by administration **before** the absence.

#### **TARDY: LATE TO SCHOOL**

For a tardy to be considered excused after a child arrives late to school from home, the student must turn in either a signed note from a parent/guardian or a doctor note within three days.

#### **EARLY DISMISSALS**

All students leaving campus prior to the end of their academic day **MUST** be signed out in the front office. To avoid calling into classrooms and disrupting instructional time, a student leaving early should bring a signed note from a parent/guardian to the front office before school to obtain a pass to be dismissed from class. The student then meets their parent/guardian in the front office for sign-out. High school students (**including those who are 18**) leaving campus early and driving themselves MUST have a signed note from a parent or guardian advising that the student has permission to leave school early. If a student is being picked up by someone **other** than a parent/guardian, they MUST have a signed note from the parent/guardian giving permission for the student to leave with the person named in the note and this individual must be on the student's contact list.

#### **EXCESSIVE EXCUSED ABSENCES**

If a student has **9** EXCUSED absences/semester or **18** EXCUSED absences/year which have not been excused with a doctor note or passport, the Sarasota County School District deems this to be excessive and Pine View School will require doctor notes **for the remainder of the school year** for future absences to be considered excused. Submitting doctor notes is always recommended if your child has a medical visit during an absence.

#### EXCESSIVE EXCUSED TARDIES (LATE TO SCHOOL)

If a student has **9** excused tardies/semester or **18** excused tardies/year, Pine View School considers this excessive and will require doctor notes **for the remainder of the year** for all future tardies to be excused.

#### UNEXCUSED TARDIES - LATE TO SCHOOL

If a student  $(9^{th} - 12^{th} \text{ grade})$  is late to school five times without an excuse note, the student will receive a letter inviting them to join the "Morning Wake-Up Club". If the family 'opts in' to this attendance intervention they will receive an automated Connect-Ed message at 6:30am encouraging their student to arrive on time for school.

#### **UNEXCUSED ABSENCES**

When a student (grades 6-12) has 5 unexcused absences (full day or any day with one or more unexcused class periods) they will be referred to their assistant principal. The Department of Motor Vehicles will be notified by the school district when a student (who is or will be 14 years of age during the school year, but has not yet reached their  $18^{th}$  birthday) has reached 15 unexcused absences within a running 90-day period. The Sarasota County School District generates this list and any student on this list **may have their driver's license or driver's permit revoked**.

## Classroom Connection



A fabulous way to build Spanish conversation as well as develop reading and writing skills is to write and perform skits. The process of writing and performing skits motivates students to creatively bring together the many vocabulary terms, verbs, as well as grammar concepts they have been learning in an open-ended communicative way in class or during accountable talk sessions.

For this reason, our Spanish language students enrolled in Spanish II level in Mrs. Zdravkovich, Mrs. Malkerson and Mrs. Pauling's classes have recently worked in groups of 5 to compose their own Fotonovela (episode/skit) using the new vocabulary words they just learned from Lesson 2. Students wrote their skits with several characters and some included a narrator. The students had to use the main theme we are currently studying, which involves technology and car repairs. They had a couple days to compose their skits in class, and they were encouraged to use their textbooks but they were not allowed to look up anything online. They turned in their skits for corrections, and later they presented their Fotonovela in class.

Writing skits is not an easy task because the students will find that they can't yet say things the way they want, but they will figure out clever ways to communicate using what they know while using the new vocabulary introduced in class during this lesson. Once they get going, the language does begin to flow a little more easily. The students did a phenomenal job and they admitted they really enjoyed the activity.

#### News from Carline - Policies and Associated Rationales

#### Hello Pine View Families!

Your carline attendants want to help make your experience as pleasant as possible, and we know that drop-off and pickup can be stressful times of the day. Here are some tips to try to make things easier:

#### **High School Morning Drop-off in the Parent Loop**

- Students should not be exiting the left side of the vehicle at any time for any reason. We realize many of our students are learning to drive but students are left vulnerable if they are out of the car on the left to switch seats with a parent.
- When cars are unloading their students, passing them is a safety hazard. Please stay in the right lane to drop off your student and then merge into the left lane to exit the parent loop.
- Pull up as far as possible in the drop off lane to keep traffic flowing.

#### **Elementary and Middle School Morning Drop-off in the Parent Loop**

- Around 200 cars drop off students in the loop between 8:45 and 9:15!
- Did you know that we can fit almost 20 cars in the parent loop at a time? Please pull your car all the way up so that as many students as possible can exit their vehicles at one time. There may be 100 cars behind you!
- Once you have reached the sidewalk/awnings, and the cars in front of you have stopped, students should exit their vehicle. *Using the whole sidewalk for drop-off helps carline move more quickly.*
- Students must exit their vehicle on the **curb side only** for safety reasons.
- The lanes merge at the end of the loop students must be dropped off at the curb prior to the merge.
- We really appreciate your children having their things organized so they can quickly hop out. If your child requires a great deal of assistance, you should use the parking lot or pull forward to the end of the loop.
- Parent expectations please put your phone away, wait in the line unless otherwise directed don't pull around a car that has stopped, stay in your vehicle, drive cautiously (5 mph), and bear with us as we try to get all of the cars and students where they need to go.
- Efficient drop-offs help all of our students arrive at class on time!

#### Morning Drop-off requiring assistance

- If you need to get out of your vehicle or accompany your child onto campus, please park in the visitors' spots in the main parking lot. You will need to walk your child to the gate.
- Make sure to sign in at the office if you are walking your child to class. Our school day starts at 7:21 for high school students, so all visitors need to be signed in between 7:21 and 3:52.

#### Afternoon Pick-up in the Parent Loop

- We have around 100 cars picking up students in the loop between 3:50 and 4:15.
- It is essential that you pull your car all the way up, regardless of where your child is standing. You may want to remind your child to watch for you, and feel free to ask one of the attendants to call for your child if s/he didn't see you.
- Please only allow your child to enter the car on the curb side. Traffic is moving through the outside lane, and our students' safety is our priority.
- Elementary students who are not picked up by 4:10 may be asked to wait in the office. If your children are in the office after carline is over, you may park in the loop and come in and get them.
- High school pickup please do not switch drivers in the parent loop. If the driver needs to get out, please use the parking lot.

#### Afternoon Pick-up in the Shell Lot at 3:52

- The Shell Lot is another afternoon pickup location. Students will be waiting on the sidewalk under the awning.
- It is essential that parents park, get out of their cars, and come get their children from the sidewalk. This is because we cannot be responsible for supervising children crossing active traffic.
- After 4:05, students will be brought from the Shell Lot to the office.

#### **EXCITING INFORMATION!!!! NEW VOLUNTEER APPLICATION AND APPROVAL FROM HOME!!!**

All new volunteers can apply through the school district's *Volunteers Count!* database on the designated computer in the front office <u>or</u> from home at <a href="https://scs-datamgmt.sarasota.k12.fl.us/volunteerscount/">https://scs-datamgmt.sarasota.k12.fl.us/volunteerscount/</a>. This application prompts an automatic criminal background screening at no cost to the volunteer and can be processed in a few weeks. Some volunteer assignments require a higher level of screening. See the Pine View volunteer coordinators for Level 2 procedures. You can also add hours from home!

#### RETURNING VOLUNTEER REACTIVATION

Returning volunteers need only reactivate your account at the beginning of each school year. This can be done through the school district's *Volunteers Count!* database on the designated computer in the front office or from home at <a href="https://scs-datamgmt.sarasota.k12.fl.us/volunteerscount/">https://scs-datamgmt.sarasota.k12.fl.us/volunteerscount/</a>. If you are a returning volunteer who already has Level 2 approval, reactivating your account at the beginning of each school year will keep your Level 2 approval active for 5 years. If you do not reactivate Level 2 every year, it expires and requires re-application.

#### **VOLUNTEER SIGN IN/SIGN OUT**

For security reasons, school district policy requires that each time you volunteer on campus or for a school event, you must sign in on the *Volunteers Count!* computer and sign out when you complete your volunteer work. This ensures that those volunteering are approved and provides school district worker's compensation coverage during the volunteer work. The Pine View volunteer coordinators will provide alternative ways to sign in and out for designated events when the computer is not accessible. Remember—you can enter hours for any approved volunteer work you do at home or in the community on behalf of Pine View.

#### **PLEASE NOTE:** All Visitors to Schools

Florida state law and Sarasota County School District policy require that every person who visits a district school must be screened through the national sexual predator/offender database. The district uses a program called RAPTOR to perform the screening. This screening is required upon every visit to a school. Although all school volunteers must undergo a criminal background screening (see above) before they are allowed to volunteer in schools, they also are required to be screened through RAPTOR every time they visit a school.







#### How Does Exercise Impact Learning?

Everyone knows exercise is good for your body. However, did you know that exercise immediately benefits your brain as well?

Exercise produces numerous chemicals that affect cognition, mood, and executive function. A chemical that dramatically increases post-exercise is BDNF.



Judging at the chapter level is by three judges, including at least one non-DAR judge. Judging at other levels is by three judges, all of whom are non-DAR members.  CHAPTER: One essay at each grade level is selected as the chapter winner and forwarded to the state American History chair for state competition. American History essay contest chapter winner certificates and bronze medals may be presented by the chapter if desired. In addition, chapters may present certificates of participation to every student who participates in the essay contest. These supplies are available from The DAR Store.  STATE: One essay at each grade level is selected as the state winner and forwarded to the appropriate national division vice chair of American History for division competition. The state winner receives a silver medal and state winner certificate.  DIVISION: One essay in each grade is selected as the division winner and forwarded for national competition to the national vice chair. Division winners are presented a division winner certificate.  NATIONAL: One essay in each grade is selected as the national winner. A certificate, gold pin and monetary award is presented to each national winner at Continental Congress in June 2019. Winning essays may appear in official DAR communications.  Note: All essays must first be submitted to a local chapter. Essays sent directly to the national chair or vice chair of the essay contest will not be considered.


