



Principal's Perspective

Dear Pine View School Parents, Students, and Friends:

The tireless work and dedication to excellence demonstrated by Pine View students, parents, and teachers continues to amaze me daily! From parent volunteers contributing hours upon hours in our new front office and newly-renovated classrooms, students studying and laboring over projects and assignments, and teachers planning exciting and engaging lessons infusing technology, Pine View continues *to go the extra degree*!

This is a busy and important time of year for many reasons- we are continuing to prepare our students, grades 2 through 12, for outstanding success in the coming months on statewide assessments ("FSA's", End-of-Course assessments, Advanced Placement examinations, and myriad other



tests. While these are some of the many public ways in which we are collectively assessed, Pine View teachers and students truly do breathe life into our mission of providing, "...a qualitatively different learning environment that nurtures a passion of intellectual curiosity, ... and that is committed to a tradition of academic excellence and social responsibility." Through PVA support and teacher-created initiatives, Pine View continues to reinforce the arts as a critical component in our students' complete education.

Construction at Pine View School for the Gifted is continuing ahead of schedule and we are pleased to announce that *the Third Grade has moved back to their previous home in Building 1* (Red Building, School Counseling/Administrative Offices/Clinic are back in Building 6 with the new front entrance to school, and World Language teachers have been moved back to their home in Building 3 (Blue Building). Building 2 (Green Building) is currently under renovation and ahead of schedule, we are pleased to share with parents. While relocating, even temporarily, can be a challenge, we have new facilities, renovated classrooms, upgraded lighting, and new HVAC systems which are great enhancements! The restrooms at the end of Building 4 (Blue) are for all students, again, as 3rd graders have classroom bathrooms, again. On January 10th, the Sarasota County Schools' Director of Planning, Kathie Ebaugh, spoke at the PVA-sponsored Town Hall meeting regarding new construction, and has agreed to come back and share updates as they become available.

We are looking forward to adding several new curriculum options for students for the coming academic year. In addition to the 38 Advanced Placement or Dual Enrollment courses Pine View currently offers, in 2017-2018, we will begin offering Advanced Placement Capstone Research, which will build on the AP Capstone Seminar course we began this year. In addition to the two AP Capstone courses (Seminar and Research), a student may take *any four* additional AP courses and qualify for the prestigious AP Capstone Diploma, in addition to the Pine View School diploma at graduation. PV will also add Dual Enrollment English (British) Literature I and II (ENL 2010 and 2022) on the PV campus, approved by State College of Florida (SCF). PV follows the articulation agreement, as determined by Sarasota County Schools and SCF, for Dual Enrollment options for students which includes on-campus courses, courses taught on the SCF campus, and online Dual Enrollment courses. If you have questions, please contact your grade level school counselor.

As an improvement in the Course Description Catalogue, parents and students will see visual representations of possible course progressions, narrative explanations, Advanced Placement course information, as well as a "time budget" worksheet to help as parents, counselors, students, and teachers all discuss and dialogue about available time for students, workload, and social / emotional factors impacting course selection. These have all been thoughtfully developed to help facilitate the scheduling process, and we thank our Advanced Placement teachers for these improvements!

We are excited about this year's Peramathon at Pine View, which will be held on Friday, February 24, 2017. This is an exciting event in which students collected pledges for laps to be run around our PV track. Last year, I ran over 40 laps, so my goal in leading our students in the 212 degree philosophy is at least 46 this year! PVA parents, Camillia Mankovich and Leslie Korff are coordinating Peramathon and more information is available at http://www.yourpva.org/Peramathon.html.

Robots are typically about 120 pounds and 30 inches wide by 30 inches long and anywhere from 2-6 feet tall, the field 27 by 54 feet. This year's challenge features a steampunk theme. The objective is to shoot balls, or "fuel," into a goal ("boiler"), collect large gears to set rotors spinning, and climb a rope to prepare an airship for flight.

While competition may be fierce, teams interact with a positive and generous attitude, lending parts and sometimes sharing tools between matches. Students learn not only mechanical, programming, and electrical skills, but also teamwork and communication, with all the excitement of a varsity sport.

However, FIRST is about more than robots. Their most prestigious award is the Chairman's Award, given to the team that has had the most significant impact on their community. Our team, Jungle Robotics 3627, demonstrates the robot at several schools and maker fairs, inspiring kids to get involved in STEM. We also help scout troops earn robotics merit badges. In 2013, we won the Chairman's award and advanced to the world competition.

At every school and in every community there are young people who suffer silently because they feel left out, alone or invisible.

Start With Hello Week brings attention to the growing epidemic of social isolation in our schools and communities, and empowers young people to create a culture of inclusion and connectedness within their school or youth organization.

Social isolation is an individual's perceived or real separation from a group of peers. It is a feeling that you don't fit in, that you don't belong, or that you have been left out. The separation may be the result of a rejection from others, or from the person's own withdrawal from others.

Social isolation can happen in person or online. Social isolation can become a serious issue. Young people who experience social isolation can become a victim of bullying, violence and/or depression. As a result, many pull further away from society, struggle with learning and social development and/or may choose to hurt themselves or others.

There is a difference between social isolation and healthy alone time. Not all alone time is bad. Healthy alone time is when you choose to be alone to clear your mind, take a break from "socializing," give time to focus on and recharge yourself, and/or work through problems or possibilities without any outside influence. Some people are introverted, and need more healthy alone time than others.

Fostering inclusion and community is an important life skill and with practice, simple to do every day. There is no age limit to reaching out to and helping others!

The Gift of Feilure

So far we've covered:

Chapter 1 – How Failure Became a Dirty Word – "Many parents [have become] paralyzed with the weight of their own power to tragically and irreversibly screw up their kids." !!! Not a great feeling!

Chapter 2 – Why Parenting for Dependence Doesn't Work – "Learning that comes with challenge is stored more effectively and more durably in the brain than learning that comes easily." Don't tell your kids it will be easy... just tell them it will be worth it!

Chapter 3 – Less Really is More – "In order to raise competent, capable adults, I have to love them enough to put their learning before my [own] happiness." Letting our kids fail is hard! Fixing their problems is so affirming! But the lessons of failure are so powerful and necessary...

Chapter 4 – Encouragement from the Sidelines – "Don't try to jump in and resolve the situation... What you are teaching him through your patient strength and inaction on his behalf is that he has the inner strength to move on from failure." Sometimes it seems like it's harder on the parents!

Chapter 5 – Household Duties – Letting kids take ownership of chores "is going to require a lot of restraint on your part." But if we do everything ourselves "we encourage them to be freeloaders and stick with the things they are good at: watching, being waited on, and making that face of perplexed impatience..." LOL... sort of!

Chapter 6 – Friends – "It makes sense that kids benefit from seeing fights with friends through to resolution. Given that conflict is less upsetting to children than lack of closure, when you jump in to resolve a sandbox argument or forcefully arrange a détente with the mean girl who has been ignoring your daughter, resolution is not being allowed to happen naturally in its own time and place." This was a tough one for us to swallow... We are going to chew on this chapter some more!
