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
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



A Special Career: from Prison to Pine View

How many are fortunate enough to know their career path in one's teenage years? At age 16, David Delaney already did. While working at a camp for the mentally challenged, Delaney found his passion, and it led him into a 45-year career of special-education teaching. Now, after 10 years at Pine View, he has decided to retire.

After high school, David attended Columbia University, receiving a Master's in Special Education. He began teaching in the field at the age of 21 in Connecticut.

Soon after, he had a lifealtering experience — in jail. Visiting to educate inmates in solitary confinement, he met fellow educator and future

wife, Debbie. Behind bars their love story began.

After teaching in Connecticut, David and Debbie

After teaching in Connecticut, David and Debbie decided to relocate to Sarasota in 1993. They came to teach at what was then a brand new special-needs school called Oak Park. While in Sarasota, he has also taught at Sarasota Middle School, until eventually landing at Pine View School, working again with wife Debbie. He and Debbie have a strong connection to Pine View, with their two children having attended the school. They have 16 grandchildren, five of whom have attended Pine View.

In 2014, David and his family went through a devastating time when he was stricken with brain cancer. He fought and won that battle and worked hard to recover, even having to re-learn how to walk and talk. Eventually, he was able to return to his love of education.

Along with teaching, David has had a strong



relationship with Special Olympics. He was instrumental in bringing the Special Olympics to Pine View, which has hosted the games for 10 years. He also co-coached with Debbie for the middle school aged Sarasota Crew.

For those who know David, the most common description is his big heart and warm smile. He has touched so many students' lives, helping them become the best version of themselves to succeed. His past and current coworkers have glowing things to say.

Jen Giesel shared a moment from an

Oak Park School gardening class to spotlight one of his many wonderful attributes. "Dave had such a wonderful rapport with the students he taught, and they truly adored and respected him. On this particular day, there was some scuttlebutt while they were working outside in the garden with the garden tools. We all watched him de-escalate the situation with grace and love! What could have been quite a problem was resolved with Dave's calm and presence."

Assistant Principal Tara Spielman raved about David, "He has always honed in on the specific needs of students and their families. He is a legend at Pine View! While he will be sorely missed, his impact with the students he has served will be evident for years to come."

Eileen Cabrera, an ESE department coworker, added, "Mr. Delaney puts his entire heart and soul into every student ... continued on page 15

he works with. He has the capacity to establish a relationship that is supportive, respectful and meaningful."

David Delaney is truly talented to have worked with such a broad spectrum of unique students at low and high achieving schools. From educating prison inmates, to special-needs students at Oak Park School, to gifted students at Pine View, there is seemingly nothing he can't do. Although he is retiring from the school system, he won't stop impacting people's

lives. He will continue to work with the Special Olympics and start working with the Sarasota Senior Center. He will also begin involvement with PAWS and Warriors, which works to help reduce suicide rates among veterans and first responders by matching them with pet companions.

Pine View was blessed to have such a caring, dynamic man as part of their family. He will be greatly missed around campus.

A Literary Legend Leaves His Mark

There are not many differences between William Shakespeare and Language Arts teacher Paul Dean they grew up in the countryside, have an unmatched sense of humor, write poetry, occasionally dress up in a leggings-andblouse ensemble, sport an earring, and have a cult following. After 21 years of teaching, Pine View's very own Bard of Osprey will be retiring.

Dean's presence on campus has been characterized by his love for literature and chess. Both were inspired by

his childhood librarian who encouraged Dean's love for reading in third grade and continued to foster it. During the summer, she would drive into the rural parts outside of town, where Dean grew up, to hand out books. One day she brought with her a chess set that she passed on to Dean. It was with that first chess set that he taught himself how to play and to this day, Dean still has one piece from the set.

Before becoming an educator, Dean worked many jobs to support himself and his family. In his childhood and adolescence, Dean worked a variety of jobs ranging from walking ponies, weeding onions and beets, to even working 20 hour weeks stacking sodas at a factory. As he studied at State University of New York College at Geneseo, he worked at a record store where he learned enough about music to then work for a jazz radio station. Following college he worked at a printing company where he learned to press books before being promoted to a management position. After working at the company for 10 years, Dean decided that he did not want to work in management



for the rest of his life. Instead, he decided to attend graduate school.

Dean obtained his doctorate in English from Binghamton University. After receiving his doctorate, Dean thought it only natural to enter the field he pursued as an undergraduate: education.

"I don't know,
I always admired
teachers... It wasn't
about wealth, that didn't
matter, I just loved
literature and I like kids
— it was the perfect
choice," Dean said.
While he initially had

planned on teaching at a community college, after moving to Sarasota Dean met Pine View teacher Neal Scheifer at a poetry event, who urged him to apply for a teaching position at the school and thus Dean's journey at Pine View began.

Dean still remembers the anxiety he felt his first day at Pine View hoping that he would fit in. That worry, it seemed, was for naught. It wasn't long before he established himself and developed friendships, namely with his "neighbor" for the past 21 years, English teacher Cheryl Steele. In the two decades that Steele has worked literally side by side with Dean, she has seen his impact on students.

"He was the kind of person who had such a passion for his teaching and his students saw that... He always tried to push students to have that 'a ha' moment... In his unique, stimulating environment, you could see the emotional, social, mental, and physical growth in his students," Steele said.

In his teaching, Dean hopes to "have instilled in people a love ... continued on page 17

for literature and have been the kind of teacher where students were not afraid to talk to me."

Alumnus Michael Shi was Dean's student for three classes and — now two years out of high school — Dean's teaching still resonates with him.

"Dr. Dean influenced me in the sense that I was always comfortable in his class and around him... He encourages you to do what makes you happy and to follow your dreams. He's really a believer in anything he thinks is righteous and has a worthy purpose," Shi said.

Dean's reputation on campus is one of distinction that few can match.

"What makes Dr. Dean so unique is his odd, eccentric personality. You've got this seemingly gentle old fellow walking around with a coffee mug in his (left) hand and a different tie everyday, who loves literature... I mean, I think the man says whatever he wants and whenever he feels. He's so authentic with you," Shi said.

Beyond his eccentric and humorous side, those who personally interact with Dean never forget his comforting, open friendliness. Both Steele and English teacher Chris Pauling reminisce about approaching Dean to ask one question but then end up spending hours discussing poetry, jazz, or anything in life.

"He was a mentor to me in so many ways, but he also became a friend. When you trust a person you have

no fear of sharing your shortcomings, and with [Dean], I could always ask for help," Pauling said. Shi added, "My favorite attribute of Dr. Dean's is his friendliness... He transcends beyond the grade he teaches and the students in his class and he appreciates all. You don't even have to like English class for Dr. Dean to be your best friend."

When asked what he would like to be remembered for, Dean said, "I knew my stuff," and according to Pauling, that certainly holds true. "[My first

impression of Dean was that] he was overflowing with literary knowledge, he just knew so much about his profession... His knowledge of poetry, rhetorical devices, and literature was just mind-blowing," Pauling said.

Steele adds that there was never a book or author that Dean didn't know: "He was a mentor to so many of us and he's going to be so sorely missed... I hope that his legacy of literature and his passion for teaching will live through me," Steele said.


In his retirement, Dean hopes to travel across Europe, eventually substitute, and "read until my eyeballs fall out." He also plans to use his new time to write more and add to the eight poetry books he has already written "in the tradition of William Blake."

In his years at Pine View, Dean said one of his favorite memories is seeing his students graduate.

"The other day a man showed up at my front door with his wife... It was one of my old students and he

told me he moved back to Sarasota and his son goes to Pine View now... He said that I was one of his favorite teachers," Dean said.

Pauling speaks on what an influential teacher Dean is to his students: "We have teachers come and go and they all leave some sort of impact and the impact Dr. Dean has left is special... He is not a forgettable person — you just won't forget a teacher like him,"



Pauling said.

While Dean may be leaving, for now, it's not forever for Pine View.

"I always said when I die I'd have my taxidermied body put in Room 205," Dean said.

Dean's legacy will continue to live on through the students and teachers he has influenced during his time on campus. Although you won't find him in Room 205 next year, the room and the teacher behind it will leave an everlasting impact.

Onto the next Camino in life

"It's been a great run. I have been truly, truly blessed to teach at Pine View during the last 33 years. I did spend my whole career there, so I'm a little biased, but I will say I would not have wanted to teach anywhere else," Spanish teacher Patti Gerlek said over the phone in regard to her newly announced plans for retirement.

With degrees in Spanish Language and Literature along with Psychology, Gerlek wasn't exactly sure what she wanted to do when she graduated from college. After working with Spanish speaking children in a mental health clinic, though, she said she stumbled upon teaching. Gerlek began working inside classrooms as an aide and, after this experience, knew she wanted to teach.

"I kind of fell into it. I didn't grow up always wanting to be a teacher... I had my language degree already, but had to go and get my education degree on top of that," Gerlek said.

After spending two years teaching in New Hampshire, Gerlek began teaching at Pine View, and not without making a significant mark.

"Some of my most favorite memories [at Pine View] are from working on student productions, such as Variety Shows and Miss Pine View," Gerlek said. "I was the founder of Miss Pine View... Some tenth-grade girls came to me and I started it with them, and for seven years I was the MC, the host. I loved doing that, getting to work with the students."

In December of 2019, she decided this year was going to be her last teaching at Pine View.

"I knew [retirement] was coming; I just wanted to make sure that I was done, that I was ready to move on with my own personal world. There comes a point, and I was told this by other veteran teachers when you just know that it is time. It's time to make the transition out of the classroom, and that's what I went away and thought about. And I said 'yes,' this will be my last year," Gerlek said, detailing her thought process on retiring.

While Gerlek is ready to retire, she was not prepared to say goodbye to her students so soon. In



fact, she didn't even get the chance to tell students about her decision in person. Instead, she had to send an email.

"In that letter, I told [students] that I was retiring. My hope was to tell [them] the first day back after spring break. Rumors were out there, and kids asked me and I wanted to be really vague because I really wanted to make an announcement about it.

And for me, as a teacher, I wanted closure. I wanted to say goodbye," Gerlek said, dejectedly. "I'm really disappointed that I won't get to stand in front of [my students] one more time and say, 'Buenos Dias.' As a teacher it's really important to have a beginning and an end, and I got robbed of that."

Gerlek is not looking to completely stray from teaching, though, as she plans to tutor students in Spanish along with instruct qi gong/tai chi. After her initial retirement, she also plans to, of course, spend more time with family and eventually walk El Camino de Santiago (The Walk of Saint James) in Spain. She teaches her classes about the walk each year.

"I'm out of the classroom, but I am certainly not sitting in a rocking chair," Gerlek said.

Gerlek enjoys connecting with her students beyond the classroom, often offering to listen or giveadvice if a student requests it. Tenth-grader Zander Moricz, who has had Gerlek for multiple years as a teacher, frequently seeks her out for advice.

"Señora G. has supported me since I came to Pine View in middle school and has helped me through some of the most difficult times of my life. Over the last four years, we have established a tradition of tea time where I had a safe space to complain, worry out loud, and seek advice from one of the only people I can truly trust. Señora G. has never just been a Spanish teacher. without her I don't know where I would

be or even who I would be. I love her and she has changed who I am and what Pine View is — for the better," Moricz said through a message when asked how Gerlek has impacted his life.

This statement shows just how deeply Gerlek has impacted even just one student, and, further, that she likely will be remembered in the way she wishes.

"I would like to be remembered as someone who taught the full child, more than just Spanish. [These kids] are more than just students in front

of me who I have to dump information into. I want to be known as someone who really cared about her students," Gerlek said.

Happy Travels, Senora Zdravkovich!

A fter over a decade of helping students along their journeys into the Spanish language, Spanish and technology teacher Patricia Zdravkovich announced her plans for retirement.

Zdravkovich grew up in Illinois, inspired to learn a second language after her experiences traveling. She began with French and learned Spanish shortly thereafter, finding a passion for teaching from her grandmother.

"She patiently showed me how to do many things and her way of teaching was inspirational in leading me to my career choice," said Zdravkovich. She then received her Bachelors' degree in Spanish Language and Literature from Northern Illinois University.

Zdravkovich moved to Florida in 1983, joining the Pine View World language department after various teaching jobs in Sarasota county. She was drawn to Pine View for its reputation and high standard, saying, "My favorite part of teaching was the daily enthusiasm of the students for what we were going to learn and the opportunity to collaborate with the World Language Department."

During her career at Pine View, Zdravkovich wore many hats, teaching Spanish 2, 4, and technology for second-fourth graders during, and serving as the sponsor for Spanish Honor Society. During her time as the sponsor for the club, Zdravkovich inspired and provided the means for donating backpacks full of supplies to underprivileged children in Guatemala and Honduras. Her students embellished these backpacks with drawings inspirational messages to create a personal connection to the child receiving it.

"I think that words that my students wrote, the designs they did (on the backpacks), the kids receiving them may feel proud to go to school. What more can we ask of a child than to become educated?" Zdravkovich said in a previous interview about the service project.

Zdravkovich's approach to teaching didn't end at



the textbook but offered an interactive means for students to really comprehend the intricacies of the language. She describes her teaching style as positive and enthusiastic, and she ultimately hopes her students leave her class knowing second language acquisition is attainable.

"The way she taught her class was so captivating and she really made sure every one of her kids really learned Spanish. I'm so sad to see her retire because she is a teacher everyone should have the chance to have." tenth-grader Jude Kolesar said.

In retirement, Zdravkovich aims to continue what drew her into teaching in the first place: traveling.





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
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




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

Pine View School Teams Wins National Math Challenge



Nicholas Butakow, Michael Gutierrez, Pragnya Govindu, Kristoffer Selberg, and Christiana Guan were among 3,500 students — working in 760 teams — who participated in this year's challenge.



A second team from Pine View School placed fifth overall in the competition, landing team finalists — Jack Gallahan, Alexander Douglas, Vinay Konuru (not shown), Danny McDonald and Julia Kourelakos — a scholarship prize of \$5,000.

The MathWorks Math Modeling Challenge is a grueling 14 hour event. Teams across the country are given a prompt and answer three questions utilizing all the math, modeling, and programming skills they have to impress the judges. They lock themselves in a room with only the computers and each other as company and need to deliver.

We have a rich history at Pine View of producing really good teams, however, this year having both teams reach the top five in the country is unprecedented. To have a winning team nationally from Pine View is really remarkable and has only been done once over a decade ago.

The teams worked hard to hone their programming skills over the past year and then worked weekly with their coach for 12 weeks to prepare.

Here's what you need to do:

- Go to https://yourpva.membershiptoolkit.com.
- Click on the Register/Login button.
- If you already have an account with another organization that uses
 Membership Toolkit you can use the same email and password to login.
 You can then proceed to the numbered steps below.
- Select "Create Account" and fill in the name, email, and password information.
- Click "verify my email" and then check your email for a link to complete the process. The link expires in 2 hours. If you do not receive the email, check your spam or junk folders.
- Once you have verified your email address, log back in and finish the registration process.
- 1. Complete or confirm the Parent/Family and Student Information.
- 2. Complete or confirm the **Directory/Publish Preferences**.
- 3. Once these forms are completed or confirmed, you will have access to the PVA Student Directory!

Once the Primary Account is set up, the **Primary User can "invite" other email addresses** to access his/her account. This allows the Secondary User to have their own login information, but still have access to the family account.

- If you have never created an online account with Duke TIP, click on 'NEW USERS' in the upper left-hand corner and fill out the new user registration form. This is where you will create a Username and a Password. If you have a username and password, log into the online system.
- After creating your account, you will be automatically logged into 'DUKE TIP'S ONLINE APPLICATION AND ENROLLMENT SYSTEM'.
- From the list of available applications on the left, select the '4th-6th Grade Talent Search'.
- Complete each page of the online enrollment form; making sure to click the 'Save & Continue' button at the bottom of each page.
- If your child qualifies for free or reduced lunch, please indicate that in the Financial Aid section.
- You may choose to register your student for the optional above-grade-level PSAT 8/9 test when applying online, if deadlines have not passed. Additional testing fees apply.
- At the end of the online enrollment, you will be prompted to pay with a Visa, Mastercard or Discover. Your enrollment may not be complete without making a payment.
- If you requested financial aid, no payment may be necessary; however, you must submit proper documentation within two weeks of your student's application.
- After submitting the online enrollment, a confirmation email will be sent to the parent email address.
 If you requested financial aid, instructions on submitting documentation will be included in your email confirmation.
- If you do not receive a confirmation email within 24 hours, please call 919-668-9100. Your application may not be complete. Do not submit your application and payment twice.

Just a Reminder, all volunteers need to register this year in the new system! They will be NEW VOLUNTEERS. The Community Involvement office will add level 2 data to volunteer profiles. Volunteers can add other schools once they log into their profile from the top dashboard icon. It is quick and easy to add another school.

Instructions for registering as a volunteer in the Community Involvement Portal:

- Go to the Community Involvement Portal: https://volunteer.samaritan.com/custom/528/#/volunteer-home
- 2. Search for the school you are interested in volunteering for.
- 3. Click on the school opportunity.
- 4. Select "SIGN UP" on the left side of the screen under the photo.
- 5. Select "NEW VOLUNTEER" and complete the application. EVERY volunteer needs to do this whether they have volunteered for 20 years or are brand new.
- 6. If you are a SCS Staff Member or Student, this is when you are finished. If not...
- 7. After you submit your application, you will receive an e-mail within one to two business days from "Sarasota County Schools < TheAdvocates@VerifiedVolunteers.com" to complete a background screening. Click the link provided in the e-mail that starts with https://app.verifiedvolunteers.com/verify followed by a bunch of letters and/or numbers.
- 8. Complete the background screening using the information you provided in your application. Most of this information will auto-fill so you will only need to retype a few sections.
 - Please note: This background screening will request your social security number. This is a secure server that is only associated with Sarasota County Schools. If you do not have a social security number or do not wish to provide it, this could extend the time it will take for approval due to a potential result in false background check findings (i.e., someone with the same name and birthday).
- 9. You will receive a confirmation e-mail from "TheAdvocates < TheAdvocates@VerifiedVolunteers.com"> " once Sarasota County Schools has reviewed your background screening.

Community Involvement – Volunteers Count!

Level 1 Volunteering

Level 1 is the starting point for all volunteering. You must be Level 1 approved before you can be Level 2 approved. With a Level 1 clearance, you must stay within eye and earshot of a school faculty member or teacher at all times.

To become a Level 1 volunteer, you should:

- 1. Sign up! Sign up on the district's volunteer portal called Volunteers Count! You can do this from home, at any Sarasota County school, or at the Office of Community Involvement (OCI) the Landings. OCI will notify you when you are approved.
- **2. Reach out!** Once approved, you will be added to the schools approved volunteer list. If you are eager, reach out to schools so you can get started ASAP!
- 3. Find the best fit! If you aren't sure where you want to volunteer or what you want to do, contact the school district's Office of Community Involvement to find a school that needs your specific skill set. You can call (941) 927-9000 ext. 31500 or e-mail CommunityInvolvement@sarasotacountyschools.net.
- **4. Possibly get Level 2!** Once you are level one approved, you may proceed to get your Level 2 clearance completed. Please Click "Level 2 Volunteering" to learn more.

Level 2 Volunteering

Level 2 is the highest volunteer clearance. This clearance permits you to be alone with students for volunteering purposes. This is also a common clearance needed to chaperone field trips and mentor. To get a Level 2 clearance, you must be fingerprinted by the district's Safety and Security Department.

To become a Level 2 volunteer, you should...

- **1. Get Level 1!** You must first be a Level 1 volunteer before you become a Level 2 volunteer. You can become a Level 1 volunteer by applying on our volunteer portal, Volunteers Count!
- 2. Be fingerprinted! You can be fingerprinted at the District Safety and Security Department at the Landings or the North Port Police Department. The Office of Community Involvement will notify you once you are approved.
