We hope you will also thank them with your patronage!

Our fabulous PV community also continues to come together and support each other during these unprecedented times, and PVA has continued to do our part. 
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A LITTLE HISTORY....

Did you know that the original Pine View was located across the street from Alta Vista Elementary? Pine View started as a group of portables amongst several stands of pine trees – hence the name of our school!

In the front office, there is a model of Pine View's original campus. It had no permanent buildings! Alta Vista was just across the street from PV. Since Pine View had no cafeteria, no gym, and no auditorium, we sometimes used Alta Vista's space. If Pine View students wanted a hot meal, they could eat at Alta Vista, and PV's very first Peramathon was held on the Alta Vista, and PV's very first Peramathon was held on the Alta Vista PE field. A few PV teachers even had classrooms at Alta Vista. When Pine View moved to its current location, both schools agreed to become "sister schools."

Our partnership with Alta Vista has a history and is reciprocal. In our time of need, while growing, they supported us! We will always be connected.



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

Funding Requests 101

Dear Faculty and club sponsors, student class and club officers, and booster club members, *The Pine View Association, working with the Pine View community, supports and advances the excellence of Pine View School.*

The PVA mission highlights our role in supporting our community, and we have funds available for 2020-2021. If you have requests that align with our mission, the request process is outlined below, and PVA can also help you promote any approved fund-raising efforts you may pursue this year with our social media platforms and Pine Views.

There is a simple process to the funding request listed below and on <u>yourpva.org</u> which can be accessed through the <u>Our Community</u> tab on the Pine View webpage.

Once on the PVA website, click on the *about* dropdown menu and use the tab for <u>PVA Funding Requests</u>. This tab has a *form link* to submit the electronic requests. Funding requests are entirely virtual.

- 1. Through the link above the teacher, student group/club, staff or administration, completes the PVA <u>Online</u> <u>Funding Request form</u>, which gathers detailed information regarding the request;
- Once the funding request is electronically submitted, the funding request chair or committee, as well as the Principal, receive an email notification that a new request has been submitted. The funding request is also automatically logged into a spreadsheet utilized by PVA to track the status of funding requests;
- 3. When the Principal either approves or declines to approve the funding request, PVA receives an email to that effect, which is also automatically notated on the PVA spreadsheet;
- 4. If the funding request is not approved by the Principal, the PVA Board does not consider or vote on that request. If the funding request is approved by the Principal, the funding request chair then sends the request to the entire PVA Board for its review. The policy that the Board only considers funding requests approved by school administration was adopted in conjunction with, and at the request of, school administration. PVA policy also requires that funding requests must be *submitted and approved* at least two weeks in advance of a PVA Board meeting in order to be considered and voted on at that meeting;
- 5. PVA Board members send any questions or requests for information regarding the funding request to the funding request chair, who acts as the single point of contact between PVA and the requestor. The funding request chair works with the requestor to gather the information requested by PVA Board members and disseminates that info back to the PVA Board in advance of the Board meeting;
- 6. At the PVA Board meeting, the teacher/group/staff typically presents their request to the Board. Note that this is not a PVA requirement, but an administration requirement, and the PVA Board loves to hear from those requesting our help. Board members may ask any remaining or additional questions about the funding request;
- 7. The requestor is asked to leave the Board meeting, the funding request chair asks for a motion, the Board discusses the funding request, and a vote is taken;
- 8. The funding request chair communicates the Board's decision to the requestor and, if the request is approved, the treasurer writes the check and obtains the required second signature.

On October 28th, we also hosted a free virtual workshop for parents and teachers in Manatee, Sarasota, and Charlotte County, in partnership with the FDLRS Office, on how to effectively advocate for your gifted child. There was a great turnout, and stay tuned for more upcoming gifted workshops!

Our PVA President, Karen Kirsch, and the executive board, are truly passionate and enthusiastic supporters of our students, our teachers, and our school- *they always go the extra degree*! They are being creative in ways to support our students and teachers, and they are sponsoring the purchase of additional water fill stations throughout campus- **thank you, PVA**!

We are in the process of updating our school profile, which accompanies every transcript we send with student applications to colleges and universities, and there are some amazing statistics to share with everyone! A few highlights, in summary, we are so pleased and excited to share:

- SAT scores for EBRW section for the Class of 2020 are *tied for the highest they've ever been* (688 pts)
- SAT scores for Math for the Class of 2020 are *the second highest they* 've ever been (also, 688 pts), and 13 pts higher than last year
- Mean overall ACT composite score for the Class of 2020 is the highest it has ever been (31.4 pts)
- For AP testing and scores, not only did we administer more AP tests to more students than ever before, but the pass rate (scoring 3 or higher) *was the highest it has ever been* (84.8%)
- And, lastly, we had more students than ever before score perfect 5's (543 student tests)!

Lastly, regarding student health and safety, with the option of taking advantage of accessing learning remotely, please, *remember to keep your child home if they are not feeling well*. They will need to bring in a note when they return in person, but they may access their class while at home using Blackboard. We want to keep everyone healthy and safe, and continue with high-quality instruction, and we appreciate everyone doing their part- *and going the extra degree*!

Students and Parents! Please read the following information regarding Honor Roll as your child enters Middle School!

The criteria for Middle School Honor Roll is as follows:

A's are 4 points B's are 3 points C's are 2 points

Specials are *not* used to calculate the GPA, however, we encourage all students to give it 212 degrees in these classes nonetheless.


The minimum GPA to make honor roll is a 3.5.

For example, *if* a student has a report card that is the following:

Spanish 89 = 3 points Math 80 = 3 points Social Studies 91 = 4 points Science 95 = 4 points Language Arts 92 = 4 points

This would mean that the student has an average of **3.6**. Total the points 3+3+4+4+4 = 18 divided by 5 (the number of classes). This student made the honor roll!

A Brief Look at Student Opinions on Remote Learning at Pine View


There has been much emphasis on communication this year, with that in mind, we wanted to provide a brief glimpse of different PV experiences. In November, a short survey was distributed to remote students to gather their perspective on remote learning. The plan is to do a few surveys to students, faculty, maybe even parents to provide Pine Views readers insights to our different and shared experiences this year. Pine View is a community, and we are all in this together.

The remote student survey was distributed two ways: as a google docs survey link to a few parents of remote students (Survey 1) and as a survey link from students to students on a Discord chat (Survey 2). Over a three-day period seven students responded via the Discord link and nine students responded through the parent link. Survey 1 (parent to student distribution) asked if students wanted to remain anonymous. Survey 2 asked the same questions and if students would be interested in follow up for a yearbook interview. Students were only given one opportunity to respond. In Survey 1 (parent to student), 6 students (66.7%) asked to remain anonymous, and in Survey 2 only 2 students (28.6%) requested anonymity. Students shared more specific, detailed information in the peer to peer link. For this article, grade level will provide the only student identifier for both surveys.

A sincere thank you to everyone who participated. Both surveys will remain live and will be kept anonymous as things change over time. This is a small sample, and just as I will not participate in the parent survey, my own student did not answer the survey, but did help with recruitment.


2) Would you like me to list you as anonymous, and just list your grade? 9 responses










7) Do you feel you have more time being remote? 9 responses

- Chemistry Because it's chemistry

Survey 2 asked What is your most difficult remote class? Is this class more or less difficult because you are a remote student? (Teachers names have been removed.)


- AP Calculus BC, I do not think it is really affected by being remote.
- My most difficult remote class is honors biology, likely because of the lack of lab experience that I'd get as an in-person student
- My most difficult class is probably Calculus III. It's a bit more difficult as a remote student because we cannot see the teacher gesture at the screen, and it's sometimes hard to hear what's going on.
- AP Physics C. I'd be doing just as poorly in person.
- ENC 1101/1102. More difficult because the teacher has difficulty with technology.
- Calc 3 All classes are harder though because you can't exactly ask the teacher a quick question without interrupting the whole class. This is especially true in Chinese cause practicing grammar and pronunciation in a foreign language is one of the few things a simple search can't do. Language is too complicated to be neatly distilled like that.

• It's hard to say whether being remote has an effect on difficulty. I have been putting more efforts in my studies as a whole. When the workload gets harder, I work harder as a result.

Based on these responses, the PV club Scholars 4 Scholars, where National Honor Society members tutor students in areas where they might need support could provide a great resource for students in grades 2-12. Students are matched with tutors based on availability, subject area, and location (remote or in-person). Students are referred by their teacher and Robin Melton is the faculty advisor.



9) Are you able to socialize in person? (choose all that apply)




