## PVA Funds Helpful Tool for Teachers

## Welcome Nearpod!

Nearpod is an online student engagement platform used by teachers to aid in educating students.

This year has been a challenging year in so many ways and has impacted how teachers teach. PVA jumped at the chance to fund this new tool when it was presented to the board after hearing how Nearpod could be instrumental in making any lesson interactive for students whether in the classroom or virtual. PVA agreed to purchase 45 licenses for teachers who had expressed interest in utilizing Nearpod in their own classrooms. used in math, science, music or any class as the teachers have the ability to create interactive presentations using numerous different options such as videos, quiz's, and collaborate boards to involve students throughout the instruction.

We have heard such positive reports from the teachers who chose to try Nearpod that more and more teachers are requesting the opportunity to make this platform a part of their classroom. The hope is that even after every child is back in school, Nearpod will continue to be a viable platform used to teach students and engage them in interactive learning.


#### Do you have any fond memories?

I attended Pine View from 1989-1999 (grades 2-12). My elementary school days were spent on the original campus on Euclid Avenue and Bahia Vista Street. The all-portable campus had its own authentic, PV charm. I vividly remember Python Days, Peramathons on the Alta Vista

fields, campus-wide viewing of the Cat from Outer Space on rainy days, and a few special, double-wide portables that housed the orchestra and library. We moved to the current campus when I started 6<sup>th</sup> grade. It felt pretty incredible to have our own auditorium, gym/athletic fields, and student union. So many wonderful memories – serving as orchestra Concertmaster under Mr. Bowermeister, going to Nationals as a member of the dominant PV speech and debate team, playing on the county champion 8<sup>th</sup> grade PV basketball team, and serving as Student Senate President in 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grades.

## Where did life take you after graduating from PV?

Upon graduating Pine View, I was accepted into accelerated medical programs at both the University of Miami and the University of Florida. I decided against becoming the next Doogie Howser MD and chose to pursue a career in dentistry as it was a perfect blend of art, science and hand skills. While attending the University of Florida College of Dentistry, I participated in several, pediatric-oriented humanitarian trips that really drove me toward working with children. After completing my pediatric dental residency at the Baylor College of Dentistry, I worked in Texas for a few years before coming back home to Sarasota to open my pediatric dental practice - SmileWorks Kids Dentistry. News from the Board Room

## PVA Meeting Highlights-February 9<sup>th</sup> and March 9<sup>th</sup> Meetings

#### **General Discussions:**

- \$50 Publix gift cards were given to all Pine View Teachers and Staff Members for "Teachers Appreciation" PVA received a great response from teachers and staff.
- New teaching platform, Nearpod, has been successful among the teachers who requested to be apart of this new teaching approach.
- PVA provided all Students on Honor Roll or Straight A's with gift cards which were mailed to their homes.
- BookStore One in Sarasota is still donating 20% of purchases to PV when code "Pine" is used at checkout.
- Python Run is moving along, permit received. Scheduled for April 10<sup>th</sup>.
- Peramathon was cancelled because volunteers cannot be on campus (at this time due to the COVID pandemic) to organize the run. No alternative solution was feasible.
- Angel Wehlage will take over Pine Views publication. Bridget Hannon is working with her though the transition.
- Ben Turoff is working on updates to Alumni Committee and the rewording of the procedure for the bylaws. A new procedure to elect alumni directors is needed.

#### **Principals Report:**

- Dr. Covert gave updates on new building construction. A Zoom meeting for parents with the building contractors occurred in February.
- Pine View had 17 National Merit Finalists
- New marquee at campus entry is operational
- FSA and AP testing timeframes are in place but still waiting on details on how testing will be take place while adhering to CDC and Sarasota County School COVID guidelines.
- Cobalt tentatively scheduled for May 15<sup>th</sup>.

#### **New Members:**

- 12 Candidates applied to join the PVA board. 10 of those candidates attended the meeting and each had 3 minutes to speak. 2 new members were elected onto the PVA board on Feb. 9<sup>th</sup>, Angel Wehlage and Puja Dhanraj
- Five new parents will be elected at the April meeting for the parent director positions. All applications reviewed by the current board members prior to the February meeting will be kept for the April election. All newly submitted applications received before March 30<sup>th</sup> will be considered as well.

News from the Board Room

#### Funding requests approved:

- The Drone Club received \$2000 in funding to purchase 3 drone kits to be built by students and to be used to educate students in piloting drones and grow the club's membership.
- The Luminary Magazine received \$500 in funding
- The Torch received \$2000 in funding to ensure enough printouts of the magazine will be available to all students. \*
- Mrs. Bennett received \$95 reimbursement for a subscription to the Glogster Infographic maker to assist 5<sup>th</sup> grade students with technology options when completing their Genius Project which has been an ongoing project for the fifth grade classes.
- The annual PVA grant to PVS was discussed. More information is needed on how to split the available funds in the most beneficial way between the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school year under consideration of the uncertain fundraising situation.
- PVA will pay the \$3275 for the Spirit Week T-shirts to ensure every high school student will receive a shirt.



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## MIDDLE SCHOOL HONOR ROLL CRITERIA FOR GRADES 6, 7, 8

Students and Parents! Please read the following information regarding Honor Roll as your child enters Middle School!

The criteria for Middle School Honor Roll is as follows:

A's are 4 points B's are 3 points C's are 2 points

Specials are *not* used to calculate the GPA, however, we encourage all students to give it 212 degrees in these classes nonetheless.

The minimum GPA to make honor roll is a 3.5.

For example, *if* a student has a report card that is the following:

Spanish 89 = 3 points Math 80 = 3 points Social Studies 91 = 4 points Science 95 = 4 points Language Arts 92 = 4 points

This would mean that the student has an average of **3.6**. Total the points 3+3+4+4+4 = 18 divided by 5 (the number of classes). This student made the honor roll!





### **'THIS CLASS IS FOR EVERYONE': STUDENTS REFLECT ON FIRST-EVER AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY COURSE**

A United States history class provides many Pine View students with a foundational knowledge of American society but sometimes, the basics aren't enough. The resurgence of the Black Lives Matter movement last summer caused many to turn to knowledge from these courses for answers, only to realize that the "foundational" curriculum had a glaring hole. That is when AP United States History teacher Scott Wolfinger decided it was time for some changes.

"I decided I needed to do something different. I wasn't comfortable going out to protests because of the pandemic, but I'm a history teacher, so teaching history is what I can do," Wolfinger said. "I thought teaching African American history could make people more aware and more understanding of

what has led us to where we are today and led people to be as frustrated as they are."

During the first semester of the 2020-2021 school year, students ranging from grades 9-12 enrolled in a newly-created class at Pine View: African American History Honors. The course did not have a concrete syllabus for Wolfinger to work with. Thus, one of the first assignments the students received was to research and create a curriculum for the class, essentially tasking the students with determining what they hoped to learn over the course of the semester.

One student, ninth-grader Aliciana Harvey-Lopez, constructed a noteworthy syllabus which reflected her already-vast knowledge of African American history.

"I took the class because I am very interested in my history as an African American, as well as the different things that have been going on in America," Harvey-Lopez said. "Everything that I know has been from family members, outside organizations, or research that I've conducted on my own. This class for me personally was more of developing the course and sharing my information among my peers."

"I think Aliciana didn't realize that she knew so much about African American history. She was a constant resource for me," Wolfinger said.

In fact, he used her syllabus as a guide, in coordination with discussions from class, to ensure the course met state standards. These group conversations, which focused on affording all students the opportunity to share their perspectives, defined the class's format throughout the semester. Students who took the class said they greatly enjoyed this form of learning.

"It was definitely focused on discussion, which is something I honestly liked," tenth-grader and African American History student Will Hartvigsen said. "There were a lot of opinions we were able to share and ideas we were able to put together that I don't think you could get from just looking at the textbook."

Wolfinger, who had planned on using a discussion-based format for the class even before the school year began, had similar thoughts.

"The class almost felt like a study group or a club where we got together, and we would collaborate. We would pick a topic or a time period, they would go learn about it and we'd come back, and everyone got a chance to teach the rest of the class. I learned right along with them," he said.

The content of the course started in Africa, with the people and kingdoms that existed before the slave trade. According to students in the class, it was a notable topic that they hadn't previously given much consideration.

"Learning about Africa before slavery was really interesting. That is something I had never been taught about in other history classes," twelfth-grader Bethel Schandorf-Lartey said.

"What most people think they know about Africa is that it's poor, there's malnutrition, all those types of things. What most people don't know is that Africa had the richest kingdoms... They had gold and different nuts and different animals. Most people don't realize that Africa was developed and had extreme wealth," Harvey-Lopez said.

From there, the class went on to discuss "the Middle Passage and Triangular Trade, the African Diaspora, significant turning points and trends in the development of African American culture and institutions, enslavement and emancipation, the Abolition, Black Nationalist, and Civil Rights movements, significant historical figures and events in African-American history, and contemporary African American affairs," to quote Harvey-Lopez's syllabus.

Along with the focus on discussion, Wolfinger said that the class sought to reveal perspectives that other history classes often ignore.

"With a traditional history class, you're looking at the leaders and the acts that were passed and the major events that happened, but we chose to look from the perspective of common people, people who were involved in the struggles that we were reading and learning about," Wolfinger said.

Hartvigsen sited an example of this emphasis on perspective: "We looked at the perspective of the news during coverage of the Central Park Five events compared to the accounts by people who were actually part of the event."

According to Harvey-Lopez, these conversations are extremely important.

"African American history is not seen from a certain point of view that a certain party or a certain race is good or bad," she said. "The truth is told by the facts. It's such a delicate subject because people like to shy away from information about different events and violence that has happened; it's traumatic and it's hard to talk about."

Both Schandorf-Lartey and Harvey-Lopez also pointed out the number of African Americans in the class: "Going into this class, I have never seen so many African Americans at Pine View before. That was my first time having that many African Americans in a class," Harvey-Lopez said. "Many African Americans might not know their own history because it's just not taught."

Ultimately, the students agreed that learning about African American history is important for every student and creates an understanding of how all these events have led up to the moment we are in today. Each of them echoed a similar sentiment: African American history is American history.

"Every part of American history is related to African American history, and this class really made that clear," Schandorf-Lartey said. "It really impacts your perspective on current events when you truly have an understanding of why they are happening. I am really glad they made this class."

After working all semester with Wolfinger to develop the course, Harvey-Lopez doesn't just hope that more people take the class, although she does want to see that.

"This class is not for a certain group of people. This class is for everyone," she said.

Harvey-Lopez also hopes to make this a full-year rather than semester course.

"I wish we could have covered a lot more things; it was really hard and limiting, the amount of time that we had. U.S. History is a full-year class, and everything that has happened in U.S. history, African Americans have been a part of in some shape or form," she said.

Luckily, some news came to Wolfinger at the end of the semester. The College Board emailed him and other African American history teachers in the country saying that they were looking to create an AP African American History course and asked for any syllabi that teachers had been using. Wolfinger sent them the syllabus Harvey-Lopez created.

"They want to look at all of them and then take what they want to form the course," Wolfinger said. "I wrote them and said that I had my students do this as an assignment, this is from one of my students, this was the best one, and they said 'Thank you.' So I think hers is going to be integrated in with the rest. That's pretty cool."

At the end of first semester, Wolfinger finished the class with a final assignment to discuss actions students wanted to take as a result of knowledge gained from the course. The class discussed getting involved in local organizations and starting social justice clubs. However, taking action is just one way the students see this class affecting them in the future.

"Next year, I'm planning on taking APUSH [AP US History], so it'll be interesting to go through the history of the U.S. and compare it to what I learned this year," Hartvigsen said.

"The things I learned in this class, I think will change the way I contextualize all the issues we are facing now and in the future," Schandorf-Lartey said.

"I really enjoyed it. It was sad saying bye to everyone on the last day. I wish I could stay for longer and keep developing this course," Harvey-Lopez said.

As for next year, Wolfinger plans to teach the course again.

"Teaching African American History Honors this year was one of the highlights of my career. It was so much fun, and I absolutely plan on teaching it in the future," he said. "If enough students sign up, I'll be there to teach it without a doubt."

#### Legacy Garden Construction Update

A palm tree casting shade above your head, the gentle strum of your peers playing some tunes, a beautiful, open area that fosters a relaxing and student-approved environment, and your chemistry textbook sitting on your lap as you lean forward and laugh with some of your friends: this is the future of Pine View's Legacy Garden.

The Legacy Garden is one of the most highly anticipated aspects of the current construction on campus. The concept of this project has always sat quietly in the back of students' minds, but there are some crucial updates and changes.

It is projected that the Legacy Garden will be finished around the end of the new building construction, which is either this summer or the following.

Originally, the garden was going to be near the office, but the location would have obstructed the view of the new building by haphazardly sticking out into the quad area. Instead, the location was changed to a spot near the technology building, so that the quad's essential line of sight wouldn't be blocked.

The garden will have a modern design and layout that is currently in the works. It will be adorned with two large serpentine-shaped structures that can be used as seating, along with other seating options. Florida-friendly flora and fauna will tower over the garden and cast an area of shade for students to study and relax between classes.

Additionally, the plaques on benches will be able to be dedicated to donors, engraved with the names of former staff and students. Other ideas include the engraved bricks that once formed a pathway outside administration being incorporated into their own, exclusive portion of the garden.

Social studies teacher Jenna Molinaro and former Pine View teacher Patti Gerlek, who both created the idea of the Legacy Garden, amassed the first sum of fundraising. There is a large sum of funds collected by them that is strictly reserved for the Legacy Garden; however, if funding is a struggle, more money will be collected through parents or alumni. Although social distancing does affect the way schools interact with these groups, the garden presents itself as a perfect vehicle to reach out and establish a stronger bond, especially with alumni.

When asked about what he hopes the Legacy Garden becomes, Principal Dr. Stephen Covert had an expansive and thoughtful response.

"We hope that this area...[is a place] where students can sit, maybe socialize, study, do homework, play guitar, just relax for a few minutes, and as they're seated, hopefully they'll notice these plaques on the benches and think of those students," Covert said. "Twenty years from now, they'll think of those giants whose shoulders they are standing on; that those kids from 2023, 2026 were the giants, and it will inspire them to make a difference, too, and plant their own tree or start their own garden."

In the spirit of Pine View's ever-popular motto, the hope for the Legacy Garden is to show current students that achieving the extra degree is possible.

"Hopefully it reinforces the idea that everyone can make a difference in the world, even if it starts with something as small as a brick or plaque in the Legacy Garden," Covert said.
