Dear Pine View families:



Happy New Year! I hope that everyone in our PV family had a safe and restful holiday break and is ready to embark on what is sure to be a much better 2021!

I am writing to share with the PV community that, a couple of weeks ago, I resigned as PVA president and board member. In November, both of my parents tested positive for COVID19. My mother recovered fairly quickly, but my dad spent more than thirty days in the hospital, most of it in the ICU. He came home

from the hospital two days before Christmas – best present ever! However, he has a very long road to recovery, and I am both honored and determined to walk it with him – day by day, step by step. My family requires my full attention right now, and I therefore chose to step away from PVA.


As many of you know, Pine View has been a part of my life for most of my life. I am a Pine View graduate, married to a PV grad, mother of a PV grad, and my youngest son is currently a PV senior. Pine View is a part of my life story. It has been my honor and privilege to serve my beloved alma mater as a long-term member of the PVA Board, and during my two terms as President. PVA is an integral part of Pine View and is, I believe, critical to its success – past, present, & future. I have worked hard to support PVA and Pine View – giving a lot of my time, talent, and treasure over the years. But the truth is that I have received much more from my work with PVA than I ever gave. I have been lucky to work with and get to know so many of the most amazing teachers, students, and parents. I found and made my dearest friends while planning Peramathon, setting up for Pinnacle, selling tickets at the PV Fair, serving food to teachers & students, welcoming new families at new student registration, and so much more. I encourage every parent at Pine View to get involved and participate in the life of your child's school. You will be so happy you did.

Whenever I see my classmates from my PV days, and they find out that I have kids who go to PV, they always ask me the same question: "Is it the same 'ol PV?" And I always say the same thing — that in many ways PV is different than when we were PV students — it is bigger, its campus is in a different location, it has more high-stakes testing, etc. — but that's not what they want to know. What they're really asking is if Pine View is still Pine View? They want to know if the *magic* remains. You see, those of us who were lucky enough to go to PV know that when you take a group of really smart kids and put them together in a place where they are all different (so no one is) and surround them with teachers who "get" gifted kids, in an environment where that giftedness is nurtured and celebrated, where students are permitted (encouraged even!) to chase their thoughts and ideas down rabbit holes of curiosity and wonder, where an amazing art creation or an original short story is celebrated as much as an Ivy League acceptance — *that's* where the *magic* of Pine View happens. Some of that magic still remains. And I believe that we — PV parents, teachers, administrators, and alums — are the stewards of that magic. It is up to us to keep it alive. It is our responsibility to foster it, to encourage it, to fund it, to celebrate it, to marvel at it, and to protect it. That is what I have

tried to do during my time as a Pine View parent, and as a PVA Board member. And I am proud of the work we have done together to keep the magic alive.

My youngest son, Ben, will graduate from Pine View on June 6th, and after 13 years, my time as a PV parent will come to an end. But I will always be a Python. When I was a PV student, we still had cheerleaders – and I was one of them. I've been cheering for PV ever since, and that will never stop. To the students, parents, teachers, and staff with whom I have had the pleasure of working over the years – it's been so much fun. I thank you and trust you to continue the great work we've done together. I know that the future of PVA is in good hands – *yours*. I'll be cheering you on. Go Pine View!






Updates on Building 17

2020 did not exactly fly by and, worse, it got all of us parents, volunteers and faithful Pine View supporters banished from campus to curb the spread of COVID-19 and to keep our kids as safe as possible. Amid our focus on urgent day to day matters, few have paid attention to the big things happening on campus. Hopefully, many of us still have this lovely computer rendering of the future Building 17 somewhere stuck in the back of our minds.



Only a few of us have had the opportunity to catch a glimpse of what is going on behind all those construction barriers at the end of the picnic area. Shielded from everyone's view, the east side of the Pine View campus courtyard between Building 5 and Building 11 is bustling with workers, the construction of the new building is moving along fast and is, as of right now, on target to be competed by the end of this calendar year.

To catch all of us up, Dr. Covert spoke to the Tandem construction team and the Harvard-Jolly architecture team and is offering a virtual Town Hall for our community to present the progress of the construction of the new building. This is a great opportunity to inform the Pine View community as well as Rivendell residents who are eagerly awaiting the removal of the portables close to their community. The townhall will mark the beginning of proactive communication in these final phases of a long-term project and hopefully won't leave any questions unanswered.

The townhall will take place on February 10th and by that point, the building will be much father along and visibly taking shape as in the following pictures snapped at various stages of the construction.





The previous two pictures are drone footage taken by the Tandem construction team before the foundation of the building was poured in November and provide a nice overview of the previously wooded piece of property soon to be a vital part in the center of the Pine View Campus. The next two pictures are showing the preparation before pouring the foundation.







The last pictures of the construction site were taken in the middle of December and is showing how fast progress is moving along.

Soon the \$29 million project will reveal a clearer view of the three-story, 80000 ft² interior space being built. It will house 48 new classrooms dedicated to high school and middle school students.

Lance Bergman will relocate into the new building and will find a space with all the resources necessary for college presentations and plenty of space to display all the options.

There will also be a state-of-the-art archive to display the history of Pine View School. The historical objects will be housed in lift-top-tables to permit easy access and an up-close viewing experience. The archive will be a must-see for everyone touring Pine View Campus.

The building will also house the new EOC testing facility as well as new classrooms for art, a new practice room for the orchestra, a new physics lab, and the long-anticipated astronomy lab.

In the front and back of the new building will be more picnic tables to provide students with plenty of seating opportunities for discussions, lunch, and socializing.

The Legacy Garden will be taking shape on the other side of the Media Center and will commemorate some noteworthy graduates and our very generous and greatly appreciated sponsors.

Many students are looking forward to the completion of the new building, which will improve the logistics of most students' days dramatically. While most are currently forced to walk sternly from portable to portable and from one end of campus to the other in any weather condition, the new building will provide shorter walks for our students, which leaves more time for a chat and a joke.

The PVA office will be relocated to one of the older classrooms, vacated by a teacher moving to the new building. When everyone is situated and all the portables are empty, they all will be removed. The older and worn-out classrooms will be demolished, and the newer ones will be rehomed to other facilities with need for additional classrooms. The freed-up space will be turned into additional space for leisure activities and sports fields.

After looking at all the fabulous opportunities the nearing completion of building 17 is providing, it is also time to look at PVA's part. While this beautiful addition to campus is given to us, we are responsible to help fill it with all the wonderful teaching equipment needed.

The first and presumably biggest item on the wish list is the portable planetarium so many of us are eagerly awaiting. Unfortunately, the unexpected turns of this year have left us behind our usual fundraising goals, and we will all have to pull together to make this happen.

Pictured in the photo below is the Star-Lab planetarium, the more expensive of two options with a more comprehensive software package and lesson plans. While we have looked into other options, this is the one that provides the best opportunities for our students.



Highlights and Funding by PVA in November and January:

Pine View Pride: Gift cards for Chick-fil-A, Culver's, and Bistro by the Bay were mailed to our amazing 4.0 and 3.5 Pine View honor roll students for 1st quarter PV Pride!



A LITTLE HISTORY....

Did you know that the original Pine View was located across the street from Alta Vista Elementary? Pine View started as a group of portables amongst several stands of pine trees – hence the name of our school!

In the front office, there is a model of Pine View's original campus. It had no permanent buildings! Alta Vista was just across the street from PV. Since Pine View had no cafeteria, no gym, and no auditorium, we sometimes used Alta Vista's space. If Pine View students wanted a hot meal, they could eat at Alta Vista, and PV's very first Peramathon was held on the Alta Vista PE field. A few PV teachers even had classrooms at Alta Vista. When Pine View moved to its current location, both schools agreed to become "sister schools."



Dear Faculty and club sponsors, student class and club officers, and booster club members,

The Pine View Association, working with the Pine View community,

supports and advances the excellence of Pine View School.

The PVA mission highlights our role in supporting our community, and we have funds available for 2020-2021. If you have requests that align with our mission, the request process is outlined below, and PVA can also help you promote any approved fund-raising efforts you may pursue this year with our social media platforms and Pine Views.

There is a simple process to the funding request listed below and on <u>yourpva.org</u> which can be accessed through the <u>Our Community</u> tab on the Pine View webpage.

Once on the PVA website, click on the *about* dropdown menu and use the tab for *PVA Funding Requests*. This tab has a *form link* to submit the electronic requests. Funding requests are entirely virtual.


- 1. Through the link above the teacher, student group/club, staff or administration, completes the PVA <u>Online</u> <u>Funding Request form</u>, which gathers detailed information regarding the request;
- Once the funding request is electronically submitted, the funding request chair or committee, as well as the Principal, receive an email notification that a new request has been submitted.
 The funding request is also automatically logged into a spreadsheet utilized by PVA to track the status of funding requests;
- 3. When the Principal either approves or declines to approve the funding request, PVA receives an email to that effect, which is also automatically notated on the PVA spreadsheet;
- 4. If the funding request is not approved by the Principal, the PVA Board does not consider or vote on that request. If the funding request is approved by the Principal, the funding request chair then sends the request to the entire PVA Board for its review. The policy that the Board only considers funding requests approved by school administration was adopted in conjunction with, and at the request of, school administration. PVA policy also requires that funding requests must be *submitted and approved* at least two weeks in advance of a PVA Board meeting in order to be considered and voted on at that meeting;
- 5. PVA Board members send any questions or requests for information regarding the funding request to the funding request chair, who acts as the single point of contact between PVA and the requestor. The funding request chair works with the requestor to gather the information requested by PVA Board members and disseminates that info back to the PVA Board in advance of the Board meeting;
- 6. At the PVA Board meeting, the teacher/group/staff typically presents their request to the Board. Note that this is not a PVA requirement, but an administration requirement, and the PVA Board loves to hear from those requesting our help. Board members may ask any remaining or additional questions about the funding request;
- 7. The requestor is asked to leave the Board meeting, the funding request chair asks for a motion, the Board discusses the funding request, and a vote is taken;
- 8. The funding request chair communicates the Board's decision to the requestor and, if the request is approved, the treasurer writes the check and obtains the required second signature.



Students and Parents!

Please read the following information regarding Honor Roll as your child enters

Middle School!

The criteria for Middle School Honor Roll is as follows:

A's are 4 points B's are 3 points C's are 2 points

Specials are *not* used to calculate the GPA, however, we encourage all students to give it 212 degrees in these classes nonetheless.

The minimum GPA to make honor roll is a 3.5.

For example, *if* a student has a report card that is the following:

Spanish 89 = 3 points
Math 80 = 3 points
Social Studies 91 = 4 points
Science 95 = 4 points
Language Arts 92 = 4 points

This would mean that the student has an average of **3.6**. Total the points 3+3+4+4+4=18 divided by 5 (the number of classes). This student made the honor roll!

The 212 "Wall of Fame" recognizes students who demonstrate going the extra degree.

Nominations are received from grade level and/or classroom teachers. This recognition may highlight Moral Character (Citizenship, Gratitude, Kindness, Responsibility, Honesty, Respect, Good Sportsmanship) or Performance Character (Personal Improvement, Risk-taking, Diligence, Independent Learning, or Enthusiasm). Students may be recognized for a specific action or for demonstrating the 212 "Everyday – Every way" spirit. As Dr. Covert points out when he addresses students, "the true measure of success is not to outdo others but rather to outdo ourselves". The 212 message certainly reinforces that important notion for Pine View students.

Remembering sixth-grader Ethan Isaacs

According to his family, sixth-grader Ethan Isaacs marched to the beat of his own drum. He loved pranking his brother, eating whole desserts in single bites, constructing and deconstructing Lego sets, working on puzzles in the library during lunchtime, collecting rocks, mastering complex board games like Catan or Chess, and methodically approaching any problem in his way, whether it be feeding the dog or naming a go-kart.

Ethan was injured in a sailing accident Saturday, November 21 and later passed at the hospital.

"He was a very happy kid, very cheerful. He was always smiling and laughing. He was strong-willed, very determined," Ethan's mom, Mindy Isaacs, said. "I'm thankful for the joy that he brought us and the happiness and the laughter."

Ethan's joy was contagious everywhere he went — school, chess club, sailing, the tennis courts, the FabLab, and so on. He was happy, and he made others happy.

"We would be running and [Ethan] would start skipping all of a sudden," Mindy said, smiling and laughing behind her mask.

Ethan's grandpa, Van Sudduth, interrupted to get up and demonstrate the way Ethan taught him to cross his legs while skipping. He said he still skips that way to warm up before pickleball.

Mindy reflected on the family's time in quarantine where they played board games, biked the legacy trail, hiked, and tried to make every day an adventure. The family was very close already, but Ethan and his Brother, Tanner Isaacs, were inseparable. Their grandmother, Linda Sudduth, agreed.

"My neighbor told us she had never seen two brothers so close; it was actually quite abnormal," Linda said.

Ethan and his grandparents were very close, too. Their eyes lit up as they talked about their grandson.



Van shared another story, explaining how he taught Ethan that 'math is money.'

"I would have five or so dollars and say, 'If you can solve the math problems then you win,' and he would win them. We started to call him ol' money bags because he would save all of it," Sudduth said.

He went on to say that sometimes Ethan would answer questions so quickly that he had to take a minute or so to do the calculations himself. After catching up to his grandson, he said Ethan was always right.

The family passed around a note Ethan wrote about how "ants have besieged the condo!" in reference to his grandparents' house in Naples. His handwriting was big and very neat, Linda said she thought it was on the same level as "a forty-year-old."

Ethan would often observe and write about everyday things that others might view as mundane. He would sometimes spend all day studying what was going on around him, and those nights he would shout, "Breaking news!" before letting the family know what had happened during the day.

"In first grade, Ethan's teacher thought he had a hearing problem," Mindy said, "because he

wasn't responding in class, but when we got him tested, we realized he was gifted. He was just a perfectionist and wasn't going to give an answer unless he knew it was right."

Moving from Kentucky to Sarasota two and a half years ago, Ethan started Pine View in fourth grade. Ethan's teachers were also well-aware of his intellect.

"[Ethan] was off-the-charts-smart," social studies teacher Liz Ballard, who had also been his PE teacher in fourth and fifth grade said. "Not only that, he skipped a grade, so he was young for his age.... He was just a good, sweet boy. It's quite a loss."

Peggy Barber, Ethan's fifth-grade teacher in science, math, and language arts, struggled at times while speaking of Ethan's potential.

"I really think he would have majorly contributed to the world of science in some way," Barber said with her hand on her heart and a faint break in her voice. "He would have either come up with an invention that hadn't been thought of, or he would've saved the world in some way."

According to his family, he sometimes used his intelligence to do what all kids do – try to get out of chores – only he did it his own way.

"If he didn't want to do what you asked him to do, he would look at you — he didn't say 'no,' he didn't throw a tantrum, he didn't run away. He wasn't obstinate, but you could tell he was thinking, 'Do I really want to do this?' and if not, 'How do I get out of this?'" Linda said. "You'd think he was a lawyer the way he would argue his case... it was like a monologue of all the reasons why he was right."

Ethan's persistence, combined with his intelligence, was a powerful force.

"Feeding the dog was Ethan's chore and he wanted to figure out a way to get out of it. So, he created an automatic dog-feeder," Mindy said, while describing his STEM fair winning invention, the Dog Feedinator 3000.

Science teacher Marie Rosander was Ethan's teacher this year, but she got to know him last year during the STEM fair.

"His friends always described him as the person who cheered them up. He had a great sense of humor, and he has one of those little personalities who you know will grow up and will do something in this world," Rosander said.

When he wasn't competing in the science fair, Ethan might be found dancing – just not in the fifth-grade ballroom dance unit in gym class.

"Ethan loved to dance, his Papi got him this hat..." Linda said, referring to her husband beside her.

Van continued the thought, gesturing to his head, "I had the name 'Dance King' written on it, and he would put it on."

However, when it came to an audience outside of the family, Ethan would not show off his skills.

"Ethan is the only student I ever excused from ballroom dance, because he hated it so much... I finally said to him, 'Ethan, go to the media center and write a report on these dances.' And he grabbed the assignment sheet from me and ran out of the gym and ran to the media center," Ballard said.

"But in front of us," Mindy said, "he would dance... We have a video of him making a peanut butter and jelly sandwich to a Michael Jackson song and he was just dancing. He loved to dance – you never got to know all the sides of him unless he was comfortable."

"He was a year younger than all of his classmates, but there was an old-soul quality or mentality about him," Barber said, reflecting on the visibility of his thought process. "It would take a while; you would have to sit there and let him think. You could see him processing, and he would look at you for a few seconds before the first word would come out, but we knew it was going to be worth the wait, because once he spoke he always had something important to say."

"[Ethan] was a great student... very quiet and shy, but when he came out of his shell, he had a wonderful personality and a very funny sense of humor," Eduardo Maron, Ethan's fourth-grade teacher, said. "I remember when we did 'Fun Friday,' he'd opt to stay inside with his buds, and they would stack dominoes together – that was his thing. They would try to build these big domino stacks, when you'd knock one of them over, it's a chain reaction."

"I think Ethan really came to love Pine View and the friends he made here," Ballard said, wiping away tears. "And I think Pine View was the perfect place for him. Being in a school for gifted kids, he kind of found his home in a sense. This is where he belonged; it may have taken him a couple of months to fit in, but once he did, he really did."

"Honestly, I'm just going to miss him," Ethan's friend, sixth-grader Shivam Patel said, explaining

the grief he felt for his friend.

Another of his friends, Om Patel, spoke of how he was always helping people, "If you spilled your water he would help you clean it up or if you dropped your crayons he would help you pick them up."

"Every weekend we would go on bike rides, and... we would just bike around the community and if it was a bad week, say we got a bad grade on a test, he would always make jokes and make us laugh so that we wouldn't feel bad about our grades," Krish Gandhi said about his experiences with Ethan and their shared friend, sixth-grader Aadi Bhensdadia.

"He will always be remembered by everyone who knew him." Bhensadia said.

Hearing from Ethan's friends and teachers has helped the Isaacs family through their grieving process.

"[The Pine View community] has not hesitated to reach out. Mrs. Hazlet sent a card. She said, 'I still remember his freckled face.' Mrs. Barber talked about how sweet he was, and she sent pictures," Mindy said. "We're grateful for the memories. It really helps us to know that he did have an impact in other people's lives. Telling us that, that means a lot."

Ethan's classmates sent artwork, poems, and letters to the Isaacs family.

"The perspective that the kids offered, too, helped us with grieving. Whether it was with pictures or with words, the students helped us more with healing than some adults. A lot of adults don't know what to say when someone dies. They feel awkward or that they might hurt the person's feelings. But with the students, they were just honest. They shared from the heart and it was just very, very beautiful," Mindy said.

Mindy said that the family is starting a memorial fund in Ethan's name and hoping to get legislation passed related to boating safety.

"We want him to be remembered," Linda chimed in.

The family held a small private service in memory of Ethan three weeks ago but is in the process of planning a school-wide memorial service.

COVIDucation

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the changing expectations and guidelines can be hard to keep track of for students. Over the summer, 11 student volunteers worked together to design COVIDucation, an educational website targeted toward elementary schoolers.

COVIDucation, a website intended to teach younger students about COVID-19 and community safety, was developed by the Student Community Innovation Program (SCIP) in collaboration with the school board. The SCIP is composed of Pine View students and alumni who volunteer at the Faulhaber Fab Lab, which is located at the Suncoast Science Center in Sarasota. The students working on the website were led by team leader Mimi Faulhaber. Having recently graduated from college, Faulhaber began to work on the project on very short notice.

"It was very impromptu, so a lot of the students were already involved with the Fab Lab and were kind of just around during the summer because their opportunities had been canceled," Faulhaber said.

COVIDucation is divided into three chapters, each containing self-paced lessons and short quizzes. Each chapter follows a storyline about a knight "fighting" COVID-19, with each lesson encompassing topics necessary for children to know about the virus such as, "Why was my school canceled?" "Face Masks," and "What is a virus?"

The students working on the website were divided into three teams. The content team did research and put together information for the website; the user-experience team designed the look of the website using wireframes, which is like an outline for the website, branding sheets, and logos; and the development teams did the coding. As the team leader, Faulhaber coordinated the work and meetings and handled communication with the school board.

Twelfth-grader Alexiya Mikerina, who was part of the content team, shared her experience with COVIDucation.

"I loved just seeing it come together. At first, when we just had the scripts, it was just documents of words, but then once we were starting to add the animations and recording the voice recordings...it was definitely [at] the point where we saw it really coming together and forming into a real project," Mikerina said.

Feedback for COVIDucation has been positive, with the website gaining over 2,000 clicks within the first three weeks of school.

Working on the website every week from late June to mid-August, the SCIP did the majority of the work over Zoom due to social-distancing standards. It was a lot of work, but Faulhaber thinks it definitely paid off.

"Everything was done pretty much by high school students, so I think it's really great that we were able to actually put together a working website that people are using, and hopefully making an impact on our community," Faulhaber said.

Podcast Roundtable

With many students having extra time on their hands, new podcasts close to the Pine View community are being created with young people gaining experience and building their audiences in the podcasting sphere. The Torch has interviewed multiple student podcasters on the experience of producing full-fledged audio content including Brian Zhang (Grade 12) with Nuggets, Max Banach (Grade 12) with A Sequence of Events, and Nabil Shariff (Pine View class of 2019) with Filmatic.

Tell me a little bit about your podcast:

Brian Zhang: The Nuggets podcast is an interview style show where I talk with three people about trending social and political topics to get their thoughts. I chose the name Nuggets because I wanted to keep things short and easily digestible. Each person gets 15 minutes on air, but I always end up talking with them personally much longer. After I upload one episode about each individual's thoughts, the next week I upload an episode where I gather everyone who spoke along with one additional person to have a group dialogue. You can stream the Nuggets podcast on Spotify, Apple Podcasts, or YouTube.

Max Banach: The name of the podcast is "A Sequence of Events" on Youtube. Overall, my podcast is more of a long-form discussion about current events, news, and politics. By taking on different guests, I can get different perspectives on a given issue that might not be able to happen in a regular short conversation.

Nabil Shariff: The podcast is called Filmatic and it's a podcast I created to discuss and analyze movies, film, and pop culture.

What inspired you to create your podcast?

BZ: As I was following the BLM movement I felt that many people reposted the same stories and same messages without knowing the full story or situation, and many others simply feel worried that expressing their opinion would get them "cancelled." More than anything I wanted to have a platform where people can talk together about issues without being afraid of being judged. Real substantial process doesn't come from spreading one message, it comes from multiple perspectives and all of us coming together for that cause, and I decided to make the Nuggets podcast to be a catalyst for that message.

NS: I've been obsessed with film my whole life, and unfortunately it's not something I can really pursue, so making this really just started as an outlet for me to discuss my passion and create content around it.

What is your favorite part of making your podcast?

BZ: My favorite part of podcasting is talking to people and hearing their thoughts and enthusiasm. Having a platform where you feel you can speak freely is what I wanted to cultivated, and I feel that me and my guests know that coming in. Having a genuine dialogue with people is the most rewarding

aspect for me. Coming out of each discussion I feel I gained a new look on the issues along with a deeper sense of understanding and respect for the person I've talked with. It's truly awesome.

MB: My favorite part about making my own podcast was the chance to talk to others for an extended period of time when I might not otherwise. The school environment doesn't really lend itself to having hours-long conversations with people, and you don't get to fully understand the logic behind their beliefs.

NS: My favorite part of making the show is definitely the joy of having something tangible to attribute my passions to- and getting to include my friends in that endeavor.

Is there anything about your podcast that you found surprising in the process of making it?

BZ: One of the most surprising aspect for me was the amount of time spent editing. Whenever I watch videos I hear YouTubers and other content creators talk about how they are editing, and I felt it wouldn't be too bad for podcasting, but I was surprised. It can easily take 8-10 hours to edit and process each episode. Recording is the fun part, editing is the rough part.

MB: The most surprising thingabout hosting a podcast is the cost associated. I have been able to get by hosting episodes on YouTube, but when I went on Spotify and Apple Music free hosting platforms don't really cut it. Monthly memberships are super cost-prohibitive, especially since most people listen to podcasts on one of tho three sites

How do you continue to improve your podcast and what is important to you in making those changes?

BZ: I've thought of branching into more philosophical thoughts and introspection, though, only the future will tell how well that goes. Though, as I continue the podcast the most important aspect to me is staying true to my original message of a judgement free platform to discuss these issues.

MB: The biggest overall improvement to a podcast is always quality. That includes audio, video, and content. Besides better equipment, making sure the topics of conversation flow from one to the next makes the conversation easier to listen to without making listeners become disinterested.

NS: When I consider how to improve my podcast, what I really am trying to think about is the audience. What can I do to make this more appealing to them? How can I make my content more digestible? More entertaining? Because having done this for almost a year now, I have found that becoming an entertainer and exhuming that spirit in production is really the name of the game here.

Do you have any advice for aspiring podcasters?

BZ: Just go for it! I never realized how large the podcasting community was and how chill they are. If you are passionate about something or have something to say, say it loudly. Now more than ever we have all the resources at our fingertips to spread our thoughts, and maybe even change the world. I would make sure to have a dedicated microphone as clear audio is one of the most satisfying things to hear in podcasts. Don't think too much about it and go in with a fun, optimistic mindset, and people will listen.

MB: The best advice I can do for anyone who wants to start a podcast is to listen, listen, listen. Besides hearing how other podcasts sound and how they're formatted, figure out how they're actually made and what it takes to make one. A lot of people go in thinking it's just like a YouTube video, but to be hosted on other platforms it takes a lot more than that.

NS: My advice to anyone who wants to start a podcast—there is literally nothing in your way. As I said before, it is one of the easiest forms of online entertainment to create—it costs nothing, all you need is a half-decent idea, a working computer, a pair of apple earbuds (I promise the sound quality is actually really good), and a little bit of drive. If you truly have the craving to do it, and you're OK with no one but a handful of acquaintances listening in the very rough beginning, I promise it will work out fine.
